

The Local Picture

- Philadelphia is a "Re-Emerging Gateway" for immigrants
- More than 500,000 immigrants in the region; more than 170,000 in the city
- Local immigration is notable for its racial/ethnic diversity, and for the high levels of college education (38% of immigrants vs. 32% of US-born adults)



How We Got Here




2008: Mayor Michael A. Nutter pledges to increase city's population by **75,000** people, in part by attracting immigrants

2011: Census figures show city's population on the rise for the first time in more than 50 years

The Picture Today

2013: City's population has grown by a net of approximately **105,000** people since Nutter's vow



... Yet There is Little Data to Support These Efforts


Thus, we embarked on this survey, which encompassed:



- 364 respondents
- 74 countries of origin (and Puerto Rico)
- Mix of in-person & phone interviews; online surveys

Not statistically representative, but wide-ranging



There Were Differences by Age




While Half of Older Respondents Selected Philadelphia as Their First US Destination...






...Two-Thirds of Millennials Chose Philadelphia as Their First US Destination

Why Philadelphia Felt Welcoming...

"I feel welcome here [because] I [got] a job in less than a month"

"There were so many other minorities – it felt like a place of immigrants" South Philadelphia resident



"I had my husband to welcome me"

...Or Unwelcoming


"There was nothing culturally common between us and the neighborhood we lived in"



"People here talk down to immigrants. Especially if they have an accent"

"People are rude in big cities"

Next Stop: More Newcomers?

Respondents overwhelmingly (86%) recommend Philadelphia...but some provide very Philadelphian explanations.


"Yes, but I've never been anywhere else in the US"

"I would recommend Philadelphia if you are strong and have patience with the people"



Immigrants Who Thrive Here...


...fit the region's ethos:


