Lori has had diabetes all of her life, and as a result of it she became a patient at MGH Ankle & Foot. "I always found them so caring and welcoming. So when my career counselor asked me where I wanted to work, I said, 'At the Ankle & Foot clinic – as I can continue working in the medical field – with a wonderful staff." Lori works there two hours a day, calling patients and reminding them of their appointments. In addition, she answers their questions and gives them directions to the office.

Lori's kind assistance with the patients is what earned her the award. "We have quite a large elderly population in our practice who truly appreciates Lori taking the time to answer their concerns and provide directions," said her nominator. "She is always so pleasant to everyone. She speaks very slowly and clearly and gives complete information for each call. Rarely a day goes by without a patient wanting to meet the girl with the 'lovely voice'. Lori is truly an asset to our office. She takes her job seriously and the patients appreciate her kindness and patience."

Lori is a 1990 graduate of Olympia High School, and a graduate of Walla Walla Community College. She is widowed, and has a partner, Lee Rust, who supports her in all she does. When not at MGH Ankle & Foot, Lori enjoys listening to audio books and shopping. In addition, she loves to "organize" her drawers, shelves and closets. Her next challenge is to prepare for a kidney and pancreas transplant. She isn't too sure how long she will have to wait for one, but she added, "I am preparing for it now. And I am pretty excited."
