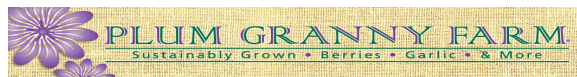

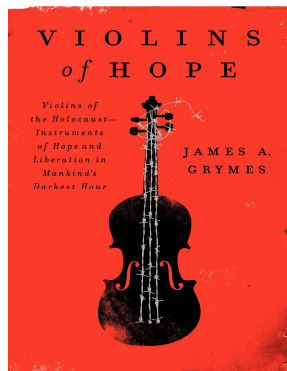

PRESIDENT RICHARD GOTTLIEB

It is hard to believe that summer is coming to an end, religious and secular school have started and the High Holy Days are approaching quickly. I also invite you to reach out to members of the Board of Governors to suggest the type of activities and communications that might help you become further engaged in the Temple community. BOARD BRIEFS

The following actions were taken by the Board of Governors during the August meeting:

NEW MEMBERS

The Board approved a recommendation from the Membership Committee to elect for membership in the Temple and to welcome: Renee Just, Neal Haberman and Annalise Glauz-Todrank.

POLICY ON CONVERSION

Last year, the Board of Governors approved a nominal fee to defray a portion of the cost incurred by the Temple for conversions. The Board approved a recommendation from the Membership Committee to clarify the policy to make clear that the fee is a non-refundable donation to be collected prior to beginning classes. Individuals participating in the conversion process will be known as "Affiliates".

SHABBAT SERVICES SCHEDULE – SUMMER 2015

The Board approved the recommendation of the Ritual Committee to schedule Friday night services from Memorial Day to Labor Day, 2015, at 6:00 p.m.

RABBI MARK STRAUSS-COHN

I love words. I write a lot. I speak a lot. What people may or may not know about me is that at times I really actually like to say and speak very little. Over this past year, I have settled into about six words/terms that summarize and help me clarify my own journey and matters of my heart and soul with which I am working and striving. I have enjoyed finding these six expressions because in their brevity, I have found great depth.

And six is nice because it is the six points of the Jewish star. But that is just me.

If you were to find words to give you inspiration and a source for reflection ... what might those words be? If you were to find words that you could hold up as a measuring stick to see how you are doing in life ... what might those words be?

As we prepare to go into the High Holy Days, we have certain words to which we return in order to help us repent. Often, I have spoken of the ARC of Teshuvah (Repentance/Returning/Renewal). The ARC stands for: Acknowledgement. Repair. Change. These are the steps in order to repent, repair and renew. It is upon us all to ACKNOWLEDGE where we have failed and need to grow, which involves acceptance of ourselves and the situations in which we find ourselves. The next step involves REPAIR of that which is broken and in need of healing. Finally, CHANGE in our attitude and approach demonstrates the sincerity and constant attention to our improvement and betterment.

These words and actions are not easy – nor are they light. And yet, Teshuvah is nothing short of miraculous and freeing beyond what we realize once we actually ride that arc and see what is possible.

And so we return. We return again to the land of our soul.

Welcome home. Welcome to a new land. Again.

Wishing you a *shana tovah umetukah* – a sweet and healthy new year for us all, for all Israel, and all our world.

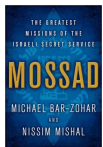

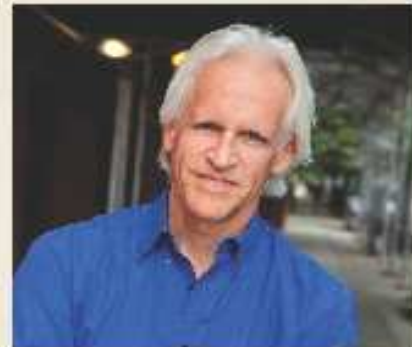

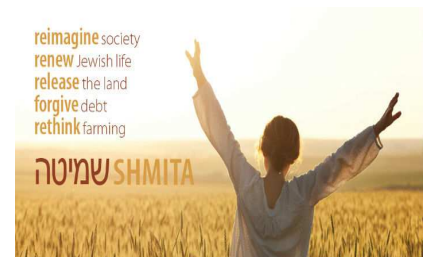
Tzedakah Drive: We will be collecting your **full tzedakah box** and exchanging them with an empty tzedakah box for you to fill this new year!
