## REFLECTIONS ON A DISCUSSION WITH CSANÁD SZEGEDI BY MOSHE GRUN

This past Tuesday night, we had the privilege of hearing the fascinating, moving saga of Csanád Szegedi, former vice-president of Hungary's far-right political Jobbik Party, founder of the nationalist Hungarian Guard, teller of anti-Semitic jokes — and Jew. Speaking with the assistance of an interpreter from his Budapest community, Csanád told of his recent shocking discovery that his maternal grandmother, now in her nineties, was a survivor of Auschwitz, and that he is, in fact, Jewish. Csanád shared the political and personal repercussions of his discovery, how he has come to terms with his newly discovered Jewishness with the guidance of Rabbi Slomó Köves of Chabad in Budapest, and the challenges he faces as he continues on his inspiring journey.

**A Brief History of the Book**  
**Rabbi Daniel Fridman, Resident Scholar**

In one of the oft-ignored grammatically oriented portions of his commentary, Rashi notes a peculiar syntactical phenomenon relating to the phrase "sefer ha-torah" (book of the law). In some cases, notes Rashi, the demonstrative phrase – "this book of the law" – is rendered in the masculine, while in other cases it is rendered in the feminine. From a grammatical standpoint, this is because at times the demonstrative pronoun modifies the word "sefer," which is masculine, while in other cases it modifies the word "torah," which is feminine.

Now, any linguist would feel comfortable adjourning the discussion at this point. But the transcendently sensitive among us are impelled to ask: why? Why does the Chumash occasionally see one word or the other as determining the character of the overall phrase?

In describing the hermeneutic philosophical tradition, the philosopher Wayne Proudfoot stresses the importance of self-consciousness in acknowledging one's own biases:

"The historian is always immersed in his own culture, shaped by the beliefs and interests of his time, and cannot escape that context to enter fully into that of another time and place. A nineteenth-century history of Rome is not difficult to identify. It reflects the beliefs and interests of the author and of his culture rather than those of Rome" (*Religious Experience*, 56).

This insight of the hermeneuticists underlies, I believe, the concept of "sefer." In an important sense, the Torah is a book – a concrete text composed in a certain time and place that requires interpretation – and it behooves us as intellectually honest Jews to

recognize that the Torah, as a finite, tangible "sefer," has its own historical and cultural context, and it is our responsibility to respect this context and do our best to uncover and understand it without imposing our own presuppositions upon it – even if, as the hermeneuticists would argue, we are bound to do so in the end.

At the same time, however (and perhaps paradoxically) the Torah is also "torah;" it is law, or Law – a systematic whole composed of eternal principals drawn from the wellsprings of the Divine – and as such resists the fetters of finitude that history (and historians) seek to force upon it. The Torah as "torah" speaks to all generations at all times, and inspires the 21<sup>st</sup> century lawyer just as much as it did the 12<sup>th</sup> century BCE farmer.

This tension between appreciating the Torah as an historical sefer and as meta-historical torah is reflected in the covenantal formula that introduces our sidra. Moshe tells the Jewish people, "You are standing this day all of you before the Lord your God" (29:9), and proceeds to enumerate all those – men, women and children – who are physically present. Then, however, Moshe shifts his gaze across the generations, adjuring all those souls not yet brought forth into the world, "And not with you alone do I make this covenant and oath, for with him that stands here with us this day before the Lord our God, and also with him that is not here with us this day" (29:13-14).

The Torah, and the covenant with the Almighty that it embodies, is thus by nature and necessity both a sefer and a torah – both an historical artifact and a timeless treasure.

# Israel Update

**Steinitz ahead of nuclear talks: Iran is Israel's greatest threat, not ISIS or Hezbollah**

Israel is deeply concerned, Strategic Affairs Minister Yuval Steinitz said on Wednesday, on the eve of the new round of nuclear talks between the P5+1 group of world powers and Iran. Steinitz, who returned over the weekend from strategic dialogue in Washington that focused largely on Iran, said that the Iranians have shown "no real flexibility." The positions of Iranian President Hassan Rouhani and nuclear negotiator Abbas Araqhchi are no different than the positions of former president Mahmoud Ahmadinejad and former chief nuclear negotiator Saeed Jalili. "The only thing that has changed is the tone," Steinitz said. Steinitz also said that with the increased focus on the Islamic State, it is important for the international community to keep priorities correct, and "although it is important to defeat ISIS, if Iran gets nuclear weapons, it's a different world for decades. This is the main threat to global security and should be the priority," he relayed. Asked whether he came back from Washington more or less concerned, he answered "I went concerned and I came back concerned. I didn't hear anything that the Iranians had made concessions that gave me hope."

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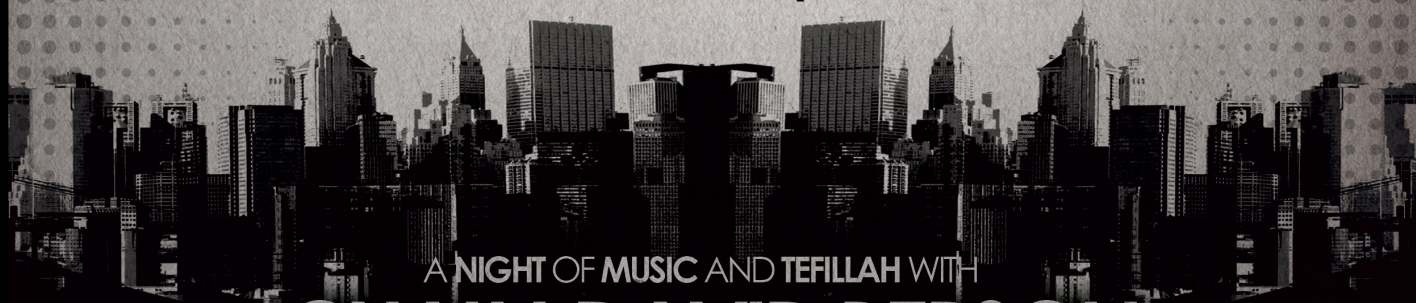

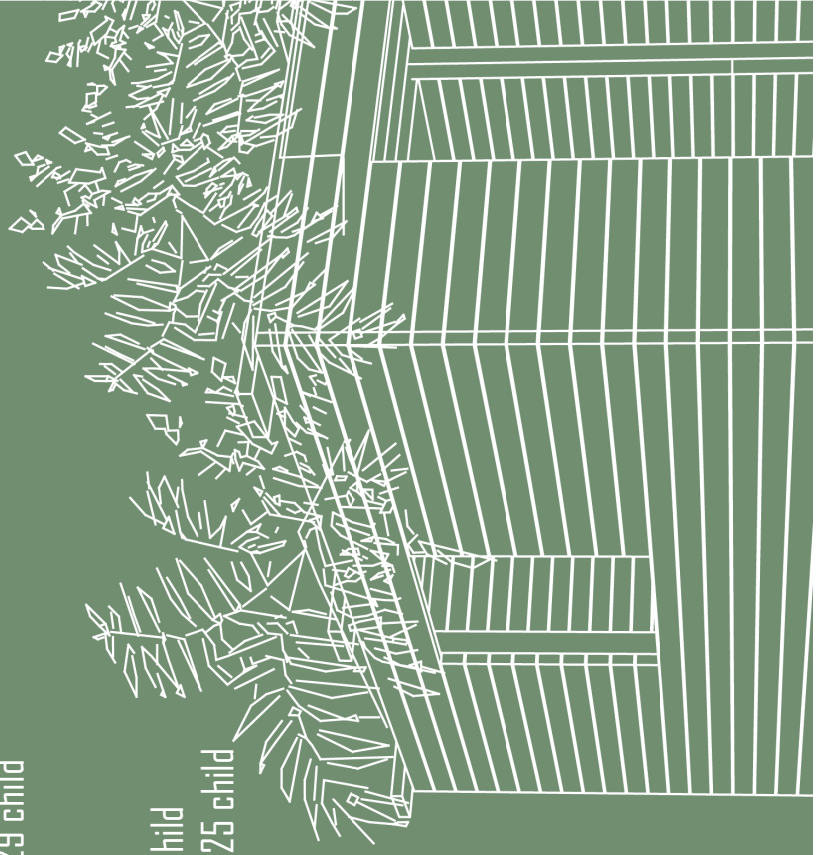

# Yom Kippur Appeal 2014
