"The Hike"

Judy, a friend, told me this story: She was asked to accompany a friend on a trip through the Rockies. Her friend Alma wanted the trip to achieve a spiritual goal. She was seeking a moment of transcendence;



something she had heard of from others, but never experienced herself. Her plan was to be among the beautiful peaks, to rent a remote cabin and, with the use of psychotropic drugs, seek such a moment. My friend, who had the time to travel, was to be the "support person," for Alma's spiritual journey. Judy, a hiker, felt the chance to wander the trails was worth the uncertainty of being the support person.

The two traveled from peak to peak in preparation for the particular day appointed for Alma's intentional journey. On the day, despite the chemical shortcut she took, Alma felt she did not find what she was looking for. Disappointed, she declined to go with Judy on a hike.

There, among those majestic mountains, Judy found a particular vista and, inspired by the majesty she was feeling, she began to meditate.

She reported the classic description of one who experiences the deepening awareness of the transcendent, the heightened senses, the flow of energy and the unity with all beings. It lasted minutes and was gone. Judy felt her life had changed. She lingered, at first, to process what had happened but eventually, she did so to delay her return to Alma. Aware that she had, almost randomly, expe-

A NOTE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Next Steps for the Capital Campaign

I would like to take this opportunity to let you know about activity and next steps developing in the implementation of the capital project for our building. As we begin 2013 the Board will be doing some work and planning on the steps for implementation of the designs we have all been dreaming about for our building.



Currently the campaign is paused in its active canvassing for the holidays. The campaign has raised just under \$1.5 million from 125 member households. A special thanks to those who have already made their commitment to the project's success.

In November the Board authorized BCWH Architects to develop detailed schematic drawings for the capital project. In addition, Conquest, Moncure & Dunn (CMD) general contractors have been retained for a fee to develop options and precise costs for the project components in partnership with BCWH. At this point, agreement has been reached on a design for the lower level including a medium-sized commercial kitchen of about 625 square feet, four fixed classrooms, and a relocation of the new handicapped-accessible restrooms. The four steps from the mezzanine level to the lower level will be replaced by a ramp and storage areas will be developed.

Prior to the first of the year we expect to see plans for the new entrance on Blanton Avenue. This new entrance will be funded by the children of Lenny Blackwood in her memory and we are grateful and privileged to have this donation in Lenny's honor.

In late January there is a meeting planned with the Board, the Capital Campaign Committee, and the Strategic Facilities Planning Committee to receive the BCWH and MCD plans, recommendations and pricing. The purpose of this meeting will be to develop project implementation plans, and decide when to break ground. This plan and recommendations will be presented to the congregation in February at a special meeting.

So, I offer thanks to all who have made this capital project possible to realize our dreams. Stay tuned for continual updates and communication.

MULTIGENERATIONAL BOOK CLUB BEGINS JAN. 27, 1 PM.

This is a new book club for ages 11-100! **Life Lessons in Literature** will focus on young adult reads. Fricka Raycroft will facilitate. Join us at our first meeting to choose among the following titles: **America** by E. R. Frank, which Publishers' Weekly calls a "well-crafted and moving story of forgiveness-both of oneself and others;" a teenage boy named America, living in a treatment facility after a suicide attempt, alternates between the present and the past.

The Perks of Being a Wallflower by Stephen Chbosky. Charlie, a freshman in high school, explores the dilemmas of growing up through a collection of letters he sends to an unknown receiver. Standing on the fringes of life offers a unique perspective, but there comes a time to see what it looks like from the dance floor. Since its publication, Stephen Chbosky's haunting debut novel has received critical acclaim, provoked discussion and debate, grown into a cult phenomenon with over a million copies in print, and inspired a major motion picture.

Freedom Writers' Diary: How a Teacher and 150 Teens Used Writing to Change Themselves and the World Around Them

When Erin Gruwell was a first-year high school teacher in Long Beach, CA, teaching the "unteachables" (kids that no other teacher wanted to deal with), she discovered that most of her students had not heard of the Holocaust. Shocked, she introduced them to books about tolerance–first-person accounts by the likes of Anne Frank and Zlata Filopvic, who chronicled her life in war-torn Sara-jevo. The students were inspired to start keeping diaries of their lives that showed the violence, homelessness, racism, illness, and abuse that surrounded them. These student diaries form the basis of this book. Most readers will be proud to see how these students have succeeded.

STEWARDSHIP AND CAPITAL CAMPAIGN NEWS

As the time approaches for the Annual Fund Drive supporting the operating budget for the 2013-14 fiscal year that begins next July, the Capital Campaign Committee will pause its solicitation efforts so Stewardship can focus on raising the resources required to maintain programming and other services for our Congregation and the broader community. While we have raised nearly \$1.5 m in commitments for the capital project, funding our daily needs for the coming year will be the focus for the next few months.

We thank the Members and Friends - representing 125 households - who have already supported the capital project. As our architects refine the project details we will continue working to move project components along. In May we will resume calls on Members to gain additional support for the project.

The 2013-14 Stewardship Campaign will last six weeks, with the 'silent phase' to be conducted in February and the 'public phase' to begin with the annual Stewardship 'kickoff event', Cabaret – "Love Out Loud", on March 2, concluding at the end of March. Contributors to the Annual Fund Drive will be recognized in an appropriate way as we seek to have all Members and Friends of our Congregation make their commitment to support our Lifetime Religious Education, Social Justice and the many other programs that make First UU unique in Richmond, and our spiritual home.

Additional information about the upcoming Stewardship Annual Fund Drive and further updates on the Capital Campaign will be forthcoming.

PEACE CENTER BOOK DISCUSSION

The Lemon Tree: An Arab, A Jew, and the Heart of the Middle East Discussion about Israel-Palestine Scheduled for February 7

Join the Richmond Peace Education Center for a program about Israel-Palestine on Thursday, Feb. 7th, 2013, at 6:30pm. The discussion will center around the book The Lemon Tree: An Arab, A Jew, and the Heart of the Middle East by Sandy Tolan. It will be held at the First Unitarian Universalist Church of Richmond.

With this program, the Peace Center seeks to develop a perspective of both peoples' histories in a way that lays the foundation for deeper understanding of the current conflict.

We invite First UU members and the Richmond community to read this book in preparation for our community discussion. The book is available for purchase in the First UU bookstore. Additional copies may be ordered through Amazon by contacting Pat Vaughn. It can also be ordered as an e-book and is available at most public libraries.

The book tells the true stories of two families. The Palestinian family lived in the village of al-Ramla. They built a house and grew a lemon tree in the courtyard. When the family was driven out during the 1948 war that established Israel's independence, a family of Bulgarian Jews fleeing Hitler's Europe took over the property, which they were told had been "abandoned." Drawing on interviews, Tolan reconstructs the stories of both families.

The Feb. 7 event will be interactive and will feature commentary from Middle East historian Michael Fischbach of Randolph Macon College.

. . . 1st UU's Architect

Ulrich Franzen was born in Dusseldorf, Germany, January 15, 1921; emigrated to the United States in 1943; and became a naturalized American citizen in 1943. He holds a BA at Williams College, Williamstown, Mass. and a MA at Graduate School of Design, Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass.; served in the United States Army (1942-1944).

Franzen resided and worked in New York, NY with his wife, Josephine Burgess, and their three children, Peter, David and April. It was there that this young man, with a mildly rebellious streak, formed an architectural firm that achieved a reputation for a unique style of modernistic design that is sensitive to the social context. He said;

"Architecture is the servant of its time and significant designs are the experiments of an era. The buildings that are designed become footprints of our own socio-cultural history, reflections of the ideas and concerns of an era, and not those of an individual."

Ulrich Franzen and Associates hold a long list of credits and awards for architectural accomplishments that are too extensive to list in this column; however, but I would like to draw your attention to one of his creations: *The First Unitarian Church, 1000 Blanton St., Richmond, VA.* (1972).

The above information appeared in a 2011 newsletter. I have recently learned the Ulrich Franzen died on October 6th, 2012, at the age of 91. His death was confirmed by his wife, Josephine, from their retirement home in Santa Fe. I will be providing additional information on Mr. Franzen, his unusual style of architecture, and his career at a later date.
