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Ball Splat

Materials:

- 1. Various balls (e.g. tennis, baseball, soccer, basketball)
- 2. Large cardboard box
- 3. Paper
- 4. Paint

Directions:

Place a piece of paper in the bottom of the box. Let the children dip the balls in the paint and throw/drop them into the box. When they are finished pull out the paper and allow it to dry.









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Paper Plate Rings

Materials:

- 1. Five small paper plates
- 2. Paint (blue, yellow, black, green, and red)
- 3. Paint brushes
- 4. Scissors
- 5. Tape or stapler

Directions:

Cut out the centre of the paper plates. Give each child five plates. Have them paint the plates in the colours of the Olympic Rings (red, green, black, yellow, and blue). Once dry, you can then attach the plates together with tape or a stapler to create the Olympic Rings.











Olympic Medals

Materials:

- 1. Cardboard (e.g. cereal box)
- 2. Scissors
- 3. Gold, silver, and bronze paint/ or paper
- 4. Paintbrushes/ or glue
- 5. Ribbon/ or string

Directions:

- To make the base for the medals cut cardboard into circles.
- The children can either paint the cardboard gold, silver or bronze, or they can cover them in paper in those colours.
- A long loop of ribbon attached to the medal lets the children wear their medals with pride.





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Rhythmic Gymnastics – Ribbon Wand

Materials:

- 1. 2 to 3 foot long ribbon or streamer
- 2. Scissors
- 3. 12 inch long craft stick/ or unsharpened pencil
- 4. Glue or Tape

Directions:

To make the ribbon wand have the children help you measure out the correct length of the ribbon. Secure the ribbon to the wand using glue or tape. Once complete, children will be able to explore their imagination and create their very own dance routine.





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Flag Art

Supply the children with a variety of different pictures of flags from around the world. You can get pictures from a book at your local library or go online and search for images on websites such as Google, Bing or Yahoo. Discuss the country and where it is located on a map. Have the children recreate the flag with art materials such as construction paper, paint, markers, etc, or encourage children to create their own new flag.











Flag Memory Game

Materials:

- 1. Computer and printer
- 2. Scissors
- 3. Glue
- 4. Construction paper

Directions:

Obtain pictures of flags from around the world. This can be found online by doing an image search on websites such as Google, Yahoo, or Bing. Make two colour copies of each flag (they need to be about the same size). Then glue each flag to construction paper, cut and play memory.

Rules for Memory Game:

On each turn, a player turns over two cards (one at a time) and keeps them if they match flags. If they successfully match a pair of flags, that player also gets to take another turn.

When a player turns over two cards that do not match flags, those cards are turned face down again and it becomes the next player's turn.



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
