Good Shepherd Celebrates Founders' Day

Good Shepherd celebrated Founders' Day and the birthday of Fr. Bill on August 23 in traditional Good Shepherd fashion: by sharing a meal while socializing and then discussing ways to improve the community.



Good Shepherd was organized as a mission congregation on September 9, 1955 and since then has grown and flourished. To celebrate the church's heritage and to kick off fall programs, Kathy and Kanute Rarey from the Parish Life Committee planned a Low Country Shrimp Boil in the Parish Hall, with the cooking done by a team of parishioners led by Kurt Hoffman and Jim Redmond. After eating and enjoying fellowship, parishioners settled down to hear the speaker invited by Suzi Herbert from the Adult Formation Committee.



The guest speaker was the Reverend Dr. Bruce Morgan, a retired Baptist minister and adjunct professor of religion at Brenau University in Gainesville, Georgia. Dr. Morgan's talk was titled "Old Camel Knees and the Wolf of Wall Street." He challenged the parishioners to educate themselves about the needs of children and families in our community. In his words, "When we can truly see the haunting faces of hunger, we realize the wolf is not far away." But he emphasized that God will find co-workers such as the congregations of Good Shepherd and other churches and organizations to help in His work to improve children's lives.

What do Episcopalians Believe?

I was having dinner with a clergy friend recently when the question arose, "What do Episcopalians believe?" He said that were he answering that question for someone from his denomination, he could point to their Augsburg Confession of faith. Episcopalians, unlike the Lutheran Church and the Reformed Churches, do not have a formal confessional statement of what the church, its congregations, and its members believe. Nor do we have official teachings, like in the Roman Catholic church, about what one must believe in order to be saved. For Episcopalians, there is no one definitive set of statements or set of teachings by which we can say "This agrees with Episcopalianism, but that does not." That, however, does not mean Episcopalians either believe nothing in particular or, on the other hand, that Episcopalians believe everything. Rather, it means that the Episcopal tradition and the Anglican tradition of which it is part has not held to the practice of saying what each of its members must confess in order to be a member of the church. No one is required, for example, to profess a belief in the virgin birth of Jesus or that the bread and wine of communion is in real substance the actual flesh and blood of Jesus.

So, what do we believe? Episcopalians have looked to the early undivided church and the early church councils for providing a variety of statements of what Episcopalians believe. You can find the results of that investigation in our current Book of Common Prayer. On page 845, you will find the Outline of the Faith which is a set of questions and answers about what the church believes. In several locations in the Prayer Book you will find the ancient creeds of the church which are compact statements of our basic beliefs about God. In worship, we use two of those creeds: The Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed. Our Eucharistic prayers also convey what we believe in their accounts of creation, sin and our redemption by the grace of God through the ministry of Jesus Christ. Among the Historical Documents section of the Prayer Book, you will find both the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion and a statement from the Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral of 1886 and 1888. These documents clarify where the Episcopal tradition differs from others churches but also where we seek to find common ground. I suggest to you that you read or re-read the Prayer Book with an eye for what it says about what we believe. It is simply not the case that Episcopalians believe everything that might be believed about God and the Church.

training school for Honduran missionaries to other parts of the developing world. It now includes an elementary school in a marginal community, a micro-loan program, a safe house for victims of sex-trafficking, and a residential group home for abandoned, abused and neglected children. Dear Members of Good Shepherd,

It was such a blessing to be back in Hayesville and to worship with you for two weeks before I made my trip up to New Haven, where I will begin my studies at Yale Divinity School in a few short days. Though I have not been present often (a Sunday or two here and there) since I left for college seven years ago, I have that whole time considered Good Shepherd a spiritual home; it was in the walls of Good Shepherd and through the ministries it has supported that I began early on to explore and come to deeper faith, being given a space to worship and the love of a community that allowed me to deepen my relationship with God. The relationships I have built with many of you, whether it was as a youth growing up in the church, or more recently going through the discernment process and coming back to the church when time allowed, have been immensely important to my spiritual formation and ongoing discernment. And though I cannot be present for much of it, to read the Good Shepherd highlights every week and to see the exciting things going on in a vibrant worship community make me proud and honored that you are my sponsoring parish as I begin my time at seminary pursuing ordination. In an age when so many churches are struggling to fill the pews and when it seems many programs are being cut, to come home to a church and a community filled with the Holy Spirit, active in its ministries, and living in the present with the hope of a bright future is inspiration for what the church can and ought to be: a Christ-centered community working towards the upbuilding of the whole of God's kingdom, not just a little corner of it.

Though I have only been in New Haven for a few days at this point, I can already tell that this will be a place that will equip me to better understand how I am called to be a part of that upbuilding and that will help me to develop and grow in my gifts and abilities. Having already met a few of my classmates, I have hopes that the community will be one in which we challenge and inspire each other, holding one another accountable, but also being there to support any in need of being lifted up. And I know that I will not only be supported by others around me in this community, but that I will have the support, through prayer and otherwise, of those back home at Good Shepherd. I hope that these next few years will be formative and fulfilling, but know that at times they will be trying. In those trying times, the support of my community back home will be immensely important.

And so I thank you for all you have given me over the years, for your affirmation of the call I am pursuing, and for the great example you offer to the church and the world. I also ask for your continued support, for your prayers as I continue to discern and pursue a calling to ordained ministry and for you to continue the wonderful work that you do!

I am getting settled in to my new apartment, have already found my way to the local farmers' market, and have started my orientation. I begin registering for classes next week, and am very excited to get back in the classroom. As I begin looking towards my course load this coming semester, it is becoming increasingly more clear that I will be doing a lot of reading (which means buying a lot of books). While prayer is what I need more than anything, if you would like to offer other support, getting help in purchasing the books for those courses would offer a tremendous help and a relief from some of the financial pressures of seminary. What I am reading now will not only be useful in the context of the classroom, but will be a benefit to my future ministry!

As the year goes on, I will be sure to keep you updated!

What's Happening Downstairs?

Over the past several years we have had a problem with water coming through the floor slab in the lower elevator lobby and Redbud room. We have solved that problem by collecting roof drainage from the front of the Narthex and Bell Tower and draining it to the storm sewer. We also added additional French drains around the Redbud room.

The Facilities Use Committee recommended that we complete that space with new floor and move the Library to the Redbud room. The current Library space will be used for children's ministries. The Vestry approved enclosing the lower elevator shaft area and adding the proper ADA approved ramp between levels in the undercroft area.

We plan to have this work completed before the Bishop comes to Good Shepherd on September 7.

Oldtimer: Helen Naismith (birthday September 9)

Like Dolly Parton's popular song, *My Patchwork Quilt*, Helen has enjoyed a patchwork of successful career choices throughout her life and she is still very active. It all began when she left her small New England hometown for government work in Washington DC, where she worked at the Navy department Bureau of Aeronautics. Her position was administrative assistant to nine jet pilots, including John Glenn, who went on to become one of the original Mercury astronauts, then a US senator. Helen's later assignments took her to the Pentagon and into the military, the latter as a Navy WAVE, with Naval Intelligence and later with Central Intelligence.

Following marriage to an aeronautical engineer and a move to Atlanta, she became interested in the culinary arts, serving as an executive director of the Atlanta International Food Festival, and consultant to the New Orleans Food Fest and the St. Paul Winter Carnival. Her first book, *Famous Festival Foods*, was based on these events. It was followed by *Country Stars Cookbook*, which took her backstage at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville. She also wrote two syndicated columns for the Washington Bureau of TransWorld News Service, *Celebrity Dining* and *Dining with the Stars*. During this time she judged competitions with such culinary greats as Henry Haller, Executive Chef at the White House, Executive Chef at New York's Four Seasons, and Julia Childs.

Helen's writing also includes four biographies, travel writing, and religious writing. She also co-authored a novel, *The Judas Conspiracy*, with biblical scholar Henry Wrenn, and later wrote her first novel, *The Mystery Trip*, which has the imprimatur of the Red Hat Society. Helen was one of the first to organize a Red Hat Chapter in Hiawassee. Two years later she found the Georgia Red Hat Jubilee, which sponsors a festive weekend getaway for the ladies at various locations throughout Georgia in the fall of each year. Today it is one of the most popular Red Hat events in the country.

Helen says that "while living in Smyrna, I visited Hiawassee quite often on weekends and fell in love with the area. I was born in New England, and have been living in the South for more than fifty years. As a writer, I returned to my native New England to write about the beauty, history and culture which I didn't fully appreciate as a child... When I returned to the South, I chose Hiawassee because of its attraction during earlier years."

"I was in Ingle's grocery store and struck up a conversation with Linda Middleton, a member who has since moved to Birmingham, Alabama. I was looking for sugar and Linda was very helpful in telling me where to find it. As our conversation continued, she told me about her church, Good Shepherd, and invited me to visit. It was a few days after 9/11.

"I have loved our dedicated rectors, Fr. Don, Fr. John, and Fr. Bill and our caring church family. One member told me she's closer to her church family (at Good Shepherd) than she is to her own biological family. I understand that. I am very close to my daughter and the grands, but I was never close to my family in New England, and I cherish a number of friendships I've made here.

"I'll be 85 on September 9; every day I thank God for the long, healthy, productive life I've lived, and my faith assures me the best is yet to come."

CROP Walk 2014 – Fighting hunger one step at a time

Since 1986, Clay County residents have participated in an annual CROP Walk, a fundraiser for Church World Service that helps fight hunger around the world. Officially recognized as an emergency relief agency by the US government, CWS is often the first to arrive to lend a helping hand following natural disasters (with water, food, health kits, tents, and blankets). In addition, CWS is committed to helping eradicate hunger around the world through digging fresh water wells, establishing sustainable agricultural programs, and supporting agencies that enable people to break out of the cycle of poverty in the local areas.

This year's CROP Walk will be Sunday, October 12. Starting "on the square" in Hayesville at 2pm, walkers will "tour the town," passing through lovely neighborhoods, including walking by

Desoto Square (our shared housing project). While 75% of the proceeds support the varied projects of CWS, 25% are returned to the local area, all donated to support the Clay County Food Pantry (our shared outreach ministry).
