## An Episcopal Journey

Just what is it that makes us Episcopalian? Is it the way the church building is laid out or how pretty our gardens are? Is it our mission? Is it our business structure? Maybe it's our vestry or our good food? Aha, coffee! Why do we choose to be a part of this church in this place? People? Music? Sunday School? Traditions? The processions and vestments? The fountain? My parents came here? These are not silly questions. They may, in part, be classed as frivolous; but all can be a part of being an Episcopalian.

For me, the way we do worship is so important. The liturgy is what distinguishes us and makes us shine. We are keepers of the Prayer Book. Anything that enhances our understanding of Liturgy enriches our worship experience and makes us feel more whole.

Many years ago I wondered what it would be like to experience the entire annual cycle of our Liturgy in a purposeful way. In speaking with others who have done this I found their journeys seemed to be very fulfilling. I put the idea on a back burner, to do sometime. During the last few months I have discerned that "sometime is now."

I spoke with Fr. Bill to get some support and help so I could perform the task well. I didn't want to miss anything. He was most supportive of my effort and has made some suggestions to make the experience more meaningful. A check list became essential, along with an outline of my path. In formulating this plan it occurred to me that others may wish to join me on this journey.

This is not a class. It will mean that you make your own plan to see and participate in "it all" for one year. We will have an opportunity to lunch with Fr. Bill 3 or 4 times during the year to ask questions and share our experience informally. There is a pamphlet available that explains the journey in greater detail. Pamphlets are in the Narthex, Hallway and Parish Hall. The sign-up sheet is in the Hallway (so we can get additional materials to you and let you know when we will be meeting for lunch.)

If you are curious, pick up the pamphlet and prayerfully consider taking the journey with me. The Episcopal Journey starts on November 30, 2014, the first Sunday in Advent. For additional information/questions contact Kathy Wright, 828 -837-6703.

## A Deeper Blessedness

In my Bible reading over the past year, I have been struck by the number of times the text has spoken to me about sacrifice, dying to self, taking up the cross, and following Jesus. The text, of course, says many things besides these, yet this is what the eyes of my heart have received and most held onto. I wonder about experiences like this and I am reminded that the way of being a disciple is not for those seeking the easy way, but it is rather the blessed way of Christ shared with fellow pilgrims. What I have learned, but need to continually relearn, is that the way of blessedness is one in which letting go those things I want for myself and letting go of the many gifts God has given me is the way into a deeper experience of blessedness. So, in what may sound strange to modern consumerist ears, I can say I am grateful for what my journey from the halls of the College of Charleston to the pulpit of Good Shepherd has cost. I am grateful for being able to give back to God in some modest way the gifts given to me. The giving back has freed me from hanging onto things that had or would have grown old. It has led me to new places where I have seen God in alien faces. It has emptied my hands of many of the things I held precious and allowed them to grasp the hands of new friends and a new blessedness.

You may have heard before the saying “we give, not because God needs it, but because we need it.” There is a deep truth in that. There is a deep challenge to each of us to not be held prisoner by the blessings we have been given, but to practice ever deeper forms of letting go. Christians confess that all good things are from God as gift. It is a challenge for us to live out that confession and return love for love, giving back to God with gratitude and joy.

Of the many offertory sentences provided by the Book of Common Prayer, my favorite is the one I think most challenges our response to God gracious provision. “Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself for us, an offering and sacrifice to God.” In those words, I am convicted that my gratitude is not yet where it should be and that my sacrifice is woefully inadequate. I know there is more work to be done and I ask your prayers for myself, my family, and this Good Shepherd family that we might all experience a deeper blessedness through our sacrificial response to God’s gifts to each of us.

**Old Timers** – Diane (birthday May 8) and Dick (birthday September 30) Welton

Dick and Diane felt it was fitting to be interviewed together, given their 59 years of marriage. Their mutual love of outdoor sports and singing make them very compatible as a couple, but they grew up half a continent apart.

Diane was born Wilma Diane Schultz in California, living mostly in the urban Los Angeles/Pasadena area. When she was young, her father was quarantined for 2-3 years with tuberculosis, and she has memories of having to talk to him through a window at the sanatorium. By WWII he was back home, but it was not an easy time. His Germanic personality made him quite a taskmaster, and Diane (the middle of three children) was the feisty one who talked back. She also remembers the vacant lot Victory garden they shared with neighbors.

The family attended the Episcopal church, and Diane began singing in the children's choir – the church's only choir – in second grade! She was very athletic, lettering in every sport that was available to her in high school.

Dick – born James Richard Welton – grew up in a Congregational church in the town of Rhinelander, Wisconsin. He also sang in choirs in church and school – mostly boy's choirs. Dick's father died when he was 2, and his mother supported the family by running a beauty shop and working as a seamstress. His one sister was

16 years older, so he says he barely knew her.

Dick credits his life-long love of the outdoors to summers spent at his aunt's cottage on the lake boating and fishing. He even found an old rowboat adrift and he remembers making a sail for it using old sheets.

Before his senior year, his mother broke her hip and went to live with her sister. But Dick didn't want to move in his senior year, so he stayed in Rhinelander in a house trailer. That winter Dick says it got down to minus 30 degrees and the trailer was freezing. Nonetheless, Dick stayed busy with schoolwork and clubs, especially band, and he was up first thing in the morning to practice with the marching band, regardless of the weather.

Dick says he knew from the 8th grade that he wanted to be a lawyer. He started in the University of Wisconsin with \$200 and a job washing dishes, but soon earned a scholarship for the remainder of his four years. After graduation, seeking warmer weather, Dick applied for law school in California. He got a job at a bank and rented a guest room from one of the fraternities.

Meanwhile, Diane was deeply involved in sorority activities at UCLA. Her sorority held a joint skating party with the fraternity where Dick was staying. Unfortunately, her date didn't roller skate. Neither did Dick, but he did know how to skate on ice, so he took the opportunity to introduce himself to the pretty blond co-ed!

Dick went back to Wisconsin to work for the summer, but he had a scholarship to the University of Southern California for his 2nd year in law school. Dick and Diane were married at the Episcopal church on September 1, 1955 – the hottest day in history. So hot it melted the altar candles – twice!

Diane had her own adjustment to make, as they headed back to Wisconsin for Dick to complete his law degree at a better law school. Their tiny concrete block apartment had no insulation and they had no winter clothes. Dick finally bought Diane a good winter coat to keep her from fleeing back to California!

Dick hated his first two years practicing labor law. However, once he made the switch to corporate

law, his career was so successful he was able to retire in 1986 at age 55!

Dick and Diane were very active in the Key Largo community to which they moved, gardening, playing tennis, and fishing nearly every day. For four years Dick continued to do legal work part-time with an engineering corporation that flew him all over the world.

Diane generally preferred to stay at home, first with the children, and later enjoying all that Florida has to offer, but she was always involved in volunteer work as well. Diane was President of the League of Women Voters in Florida, and she was on the board of a children's shelter she helped to establish in the Keys. Rescuing and protecting children from dysfunctional families and bad foster homes was one of the activities which brought her greatest satisfaction.

Diane and Dick have two adopted children: Tim, who lives in Des Moines, IA, and Sarah, who lives in Chesapeake, VA, and has two children.

Dick and Diane bought their home in North Carolina in 1998, but after three years of shuttling between mountains and beach, the mountains won out. They soon were regulars at Good Shepherd, and jumped into the choir, social activities, and Country Fare. One constant throughout their married was that they always went to church, and they always sang in the choir.

Looking over his life, Dick says he has no regrets. "I had the finest experiences being chief legal officer for three New York Stock exchange companies and it was an absolute privilege to work with them... I worked for the finest CEOs that you can imagine ... I had their trust and they had my trust, and that is meaningful."

### The Power of Blessing

October 18-19 the River of Healing Chapter of the Order of St Luke is honored to host internationally known speaker, teacher, author, and healer, the Rev. Dr. Russ Parker, for a teaching and healing mission at Good Shepherd on *The Power of Blessing*. Russ Parker, an Anglican priest from England and author of several books, specializes in the healing ministry of reconciliation – between peoples, between victims and perpetrators, between generations, within churches and wherever unhealed stories are to be found.

Russ is a consummate teller of stories, especially stories in which God's loving compassion breaks into this world's brokenness and suffering to bring healing and reconciliation. Amazingly, he uses other broken human beings to accomplish His purposes. He uses us, and we are gradually understanding that one of the most life-changing gifts He gives us is the power to bless.

Rev. Parker will speak at four sessions on Saturday and at both services on Sunday. Topics will be *The Word of Blessing*, *The Blessing of Aaron*, *The Way of Blessing*, *Wrestling with Blessing* (Sat night), and *Called to Bless* (Sunday homily). A Generational

Healing Eucharist for healing within your own family generations will be offered Saturday afternoon; experienced prayer teams will also be available for individual prayer. The Saturday evening session is open to the public without registration.

Registration for the Saturday sessions is \$20 which includes lunch. We encourage you to take advantage of this amazing opportunity to become more empowered in intercessions for your family and others.
