The Life of the Church

It is apt that Scripture speaks of the church as the body of Christ. Like a body, we understand the church to be composed of many parts with many functions. Like a body, we understand that church has needs that must be met if the church is to remain healthy. Like a body, the church has a purpose and thrives when properly exercised and applied toward those things for which it was meant. And also like a body, the church is born, grows, and changes. The church, like a living thing, has a life cycle. While there are limits to this analogy, understanding the church as a living thing should keep us mindful that birth, growth, and change are normal experiences for the church. Good Shepherd is blessed to be a healthy and vital church, and to be a church that is on the cusp of potentially significant growth. Yet it is important to understand that with that blessing comes a challenge.

Church growth experts would tell us that Good Shepherd is at a transitional point in its life cycle. In terms of our current average worship attendance, Good Shepherd has grown beyond what is called in the church literature a Pastoral Church but has not reached the size, organizational structure and full functioning of a Program Church. Operating in between those two types of church, we are currently living with two sets of cultures and expectations. A Pastoral Church culture places the minister at the center of community life. The minister is expected to be involved in all decisions, attend all events, and personally handle all pastoral calls. Delegated lay leadership and programs are not expected features of the Pastoral Church but they define the Program Church. In the former, decision making and management of decisions happens at the vestry level while in the latter vestries are visioning bodies who set the course for the direction of the church and who help ministry heads develop strategies for reaching that vision. In the former, it is the minister and relationship with the minister that matter most while in the latter it is the quality and diversity of programs that bring people together that matters.

The transition between the two kinds is the most challenging place for a church to be and is the environment that can most quickly burn out leadership. Most churches do not successfully grow from Pastoral to Program because it is a painful process for both the laity and the clergy. Growth may mean that the church will no longer be a place where everyone knows who you are.

Growth may mean losing personal access to the minister. Growth may mean that a ministry dear to your heart will no longer receive the same attention as before. In this kind of culturally conflicted church environment, people may become unhappy and leave. Consequently, transitional churches rarely make the transition and typically regress back toward a Pastoral sized church. This is the challenge of the blessing we now hold.

Your vestry and I are committed to honoring that blessing and seeing Good Shepherd through the transition. We invite your participation. Let us be a church where all members are Christ's ministers set out to build the church. We invite your encouragement. Stay connected with each other and reconnect with a friend who you have not seen recently at church. Ask what you can do to serve them and invite them to come and see the good things happening here. We invite your prayers. Let us all give thanks for the many blessings we share as members of this parish. There is much to commend about holding an attitude of gratitude.

And now we pray, "God make your name hallowed in this place, your will be done in and through us, allow us the blessing of participating in the building of your Kingdom."

Losing the War on Hunger in Western North Carolina

(This is a summary presented by the Outreach Committee of an article appearing in the *Asheville Citizen-Times* on August 25, 2014.)

An article appeared in the *Asheville Citizens- Times* on August 25, 2014, reporting on the deteriorating ability of families in WNC to get enough food. Too many families in Western North Carolina struggle to feed themselves, and that struggle is getting worse. A new study shows that more people in WNC are without adequate food than the number reported at the lowest point of the recession. Here are some of the cold, hard facts.

- Almost 108,000 people in WNC have turned to food pantries/banks and meal service programs to feed themselves. This is only the number reported. It is likely that the actual number is significantly greater.
- 60% of the households in WNC seeking food assistance survive on less than **\$1,000/month**.
- 75% of families have to choose between paying for food or for utilities. More than 50% have to choose between paying for food or for housing. 63% have to choose between paying for food or for medicine.
- Nearly 90% of households buy the cheapest food available regardless of nutritional value. Healthier food is either not available at the food assistance locations or it is too expensive at stores.
- MANNA, the primary source for local food assistance programs in WNC, says that the shortage of healthier food, such as fresh fruit

and vegetables, meat, poultry, and dairy products, is due to MANNA's shortage of freezer and cooler space **but not a shortage of the healthier food itself.**

How can the conditions described in the study exist in a society that claims it is moral and just? Even more troubling is why they exist in what a substantial majority claim is a Christian nation. The often repeated commands of Jesus to feed the hungry and care for the poor are either falling on deaf ears; or if they are heard, then this "Christian" nation has decided it just doesn't want to follow them.

We believe that is not so at Good Shepherd. Last year our vestry allocated a meaningful amount from the budget to outreach. Added to that is the money raised by The Parade of Tables, The Country Fare, and Sharing Christmas. About 35% of the money for outreach goes to feed the hungry. Additionally, many parishioners devote countless hours to help get the food delivered to those in need.

This is not the time, however, for Good Shepherd to risk injury by patting itself on the back; there is much more to do. In 2015 let's enlist our friends to join us in the war against

Hunger by doing two things: (1) increase the money and volunteer time devoted to feeding the hungry; and (2) write, call, and petition our local, state, and national elected officials to break the political logjam that is preventing the much needed resources from getting to the front lines. Finally, let us always remember these words of Jesus: **"...I tell you the truth, whatever you did for the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."** (Mt 25:40)

Playground Update

In last month's newsletter we outlined the process the playground committee has in place to make a playground for Good Shepherd a reality. As part of that process, we applied for a \$5,000 grant from the diocesan Congregational Vitality Grant Committee. We are extremely excited to tell you that we were awarded that grant with enthusiastic support from the Committee! Along with your contributions and pledges toward the playground, this grant money has brought us to about the halfway point of reaching the monetary goal that will allow us to fully fund a playground.

One of the requirements of the grant application was the completion of the Best Practice's Survey by 50% of the congregation. As a result of your input, we scored highest on 1) Reaches out, and 2) Invites, Incorporates. (For anyone interested, a full survey synopsis is available in the church office.) We want to thank each of you that took the time to complete this survey that reflects much of who we are and hope to

continue to be as a parish.

Our parish profile reflects that an important goal for Good Shepherd is to reach out to and grow in the area of children and families. We are a loving, giving and welcoming parish that is and can be a blessing to young families. A playground is a basic facility that parents now look for in a church, so we thank you for your love and support of this project.

We will be applying for a Diocesan Fiscal Ministries Grant in mid-February. If you wish to contribute, please make a check payable to Good Shepherd and write 'playground' in the memo section; and please keep us in your prayers. Our goal is to make this playground a reality by Spring, 2015! We will keep you posted on our progress.

Year End Update from the Treasurer

The note from me in the November newsletter was not as direct as it could have been. So let me state the financial situation of our church's operating account a little more clearly.

The 2014 Stewardship Campaign returned an increase in the number of pledges and the amounts pledged. Based upon those pledges and an estimate of other giving, and with the input from ministry heads who receive budgeted funds, a budget was established for 2014 by the Finance Committee and approved by the Vestry. It included some enhancements in the programs of the church – for instance children's programs, adult education and parish life were all augmented financially, as were other ministry areas. The 2014 budget and planned programs were ambitious, the bar was set high, but not unreasonably so.

The programs of the church have grown, many plans were completed and these are coming in under budget on the expense-side overall. In organizations like ours, expenditures for day-to-day operations and program costs have to be made prior to the income having been received. So expenses are shopped carefully and plans are made in faith that the contributions will be received as indicated on the pledge cards. The work that was done in the new undercroft areas and on the grounds of the church did not use any of the operating account funds. That work was done with designated gift money.

When the giving to the operating account suddenly lags, or worst case doesn't arrive, then a deficit happens. This happened to us in late

September and October. The operating account had a shortfall of (\$26,964) on October 31st. By November 30th the operating account was reduced to a shortfall of (\$20,706). I have projected our year-end balance in the operating account and to be a shortfall of (\$21,380). Despite having this shortfall, the church was able to meet its commitment to Outreach fully.

In summary, expense-wise we have accomplished a lot and done it by spending less than anticipated. Income-wise the parish has given more to the work of the parish in 2014 than in 2013. But the giving slowed this fall and, as of now, it looks like we are not going to make the goal set by the budget in January 2014. If you are able to contribute a little extra to help narrow the gap, that will be very helpful to the church. Nationally, it seems that 2014 charitable giving has slowed, but with your help Good Shepherd will not be a part of that trend.

Any deficit left in the operating account at the end of 2014 will impact the church's plans and the budget for 2015. Returning your pledge card will help us to make a more accurate budget and plan the year accordingly. If you received your year-end 2014 contribution statement and it shows a shortfall in giving and you wish to pay that off during 2015, please mark those contributions as "prior year".

Absentee Voting Procedures for Vestry Election

The procedure for absentee voting is:

1. Absentee ballots may be requested from the Parish office during normal business hours, in person, by phone, by mail or by email. When an absentee ballot shall be requested, the Parish office issuing the ballot shall mark the requester's name from the master list of Parish members eligible to vote, and such person shall not be permitted to vote in person without first surrendering the absentee ballot in blank.
2. Absentee ballots must have been physically received in the Parish office not later than noon on January 16.
3. An absentee ballot shall be sealed in a plain envelope without the voter's name appearing. The envelope containing the ballot shall be placed in a second envelope that does include the voter's name so that it may be checked as received.
4. All absentee ballots shall be opened as soon as the ballot boxes are closed, and their count shall be supervised in the same manner as regular ballots.

The vestry election will take place on January 11 and 18 after both services. Absentee ballots may be requested now but will not be mailed until January 2. Absentee ballots must arrive back in the church office by noon on January 16.
