A Note from Chuck

November Reminds Us of Thanksgiving

Dear friends,

I have heard it said that more calories are consumed at one meal by Americans on Thanksgiving Day than on any other single day of the year. I don't know about you, but in my family that has got to be true. We love Thanksgiving.

There is usually a chill in the air, friends stop by, and after eating far too much at a celebratory meal, it is great to watch a game or two.

Thanksgiving is among our most favorite holidays. As you know, in 1620 a group of 122 people left England on a ship, the *Mayflower*, and landed at, what they named, Plymouth, Massachusetts. That first winter was exceedingly difficult and only half of the original group survived. By 1621, the Pilgrims, as they were called, had a successful harvest, thanks to the Wampanoag Indians, who taught them how to cultivate crops that grew in the new world. A day of Thanksgiving was declared by the Governor of this small group of people. It was not until 1863, in the midst of the American Civil War that Abraham Lincoln declared a national holiday to be celebrated every year on the third Thursday of November.

To cultivate a thankful heart will go a long way in alleviating most of our problems. In this country we have so much for which to be thankful. Most of us have enough to eat, a place to live, freedom to pursue our dreams. This is not true for most of the world. We often forget that there are six billion people on this planet, many of whom live in poverty.

But, I think true thankfulness comes from knowing who we are and whose we are. As Christians, we have been "marked as Christ's own forever," and we worship a God

The Parable of the Trapeze—Turning the fear of transformation into the transformation of fear ...

[Each month I attend a program offered by The Diocese of Virginia called, "Fresh Start". It is a program designed specifically for priests who are either newly ordained or new to the diocese. I am perhaps the oldest priest in attendance and wild horses couldn't keep me away from the monthly meeting. I enjoy it so much. In the October meeting we were given this article on transition and I thought you might appreciate this parable as well. See if you can identify where you are in this process we call transition. Praying for us all as we continue this journey together. Peace, Chuck]

Sometimes I feel that my life is a series of trapeze swings. I'm either hanging on to a trapeze bar swinging along or, for a few moments in my life, I'm hurtling across space in between trapeze bars.

Most of the time, I spend my life hanging on for dear life to my trapeze-bar-of-the-moment. It carries me along at a certain steady rate of swing and I have the feeling that I'm in control of my life. I know most of the right questions and even some of the answers.

But every once in a while as I'm merrily (or not-so-merrily) swinging along, I look out ahead of me into the distance and what do I see? I see another trapeze bar swinging toward me. It's empty and I know, in that place in me that knows, that this new trapeze bar has my name written on it. It is my next step, my growth, my aliveness coming to get me. In my heart of hearts I know that, for me to grow, I must release my grip on this present, well known bar and move to the new one.

Each time it happens to me, I hope (no, I pray) that I won't have to let go of my old familiar bar completely before I grab the new one. But in my knowing place, I know that I must totally release my grasp on my old bar and, for some moment in time, I must hurtle across space before I can grab onto the new bar.

Each time, I am filled with terror. It doesn't matter that in all of my previous hurtles across the void of unknowing I have always made it. I am each time afraid that I will miss, that I will be crushed on unseen rocks in the bottomless chasm between bars. I do it anyway. Perhaps this is the essence of what the mystics call the faith experience. No guarantees, no

net, no insurance policy, but you do it anyway because somehow to keep hanging on to that old bar is no longer on the list of alternatives. So, for an eternity that can last a microsecond or a thousand lifetimes, I soar across the dark void of "the past is gone, the future is not here yet." It's called "transition." I have come to believe that this transition is the only place that real change occurs. I mean real change, not the pseudo-change that only lasts until the next time my old buttons get punched.

I have noticed that, in our culture, this transition zone is looked upon as a "no-thing," a no-place between places. Sure, the old trapeze bar was real, and that new one coming towards me, I hope that's real, too. But the void in between? Is that just a scary, confusing, disorienting nowhere that must be gotten through as fast as unconsciously as possible?

NO! What a wasted opportunity that would be. I have a sneaking suspicion that the transition zone is the only real thing and the bars are illusions we dream up to avoid the void where real change, the real growth, occurs for us. Whether or not my hunch is true, it remains that the transition zones in our lives are incredibly rich places. They should be honored, even savored. Yes, with all the pain and fear and feelings of being out of control that can (but not necessarily) accompany transitions, they are still the most alive, most growth-filled, passionate, expansive moments of our lives.

Envelopes - your questions answered

A new parishioner recently asked me about receiving offering envelopes after registering as a parish member. This particular household had signed up to become members through our Fall Planned Giving Campaign and then they didn't receive envelopes immediately and inquired as to when they should expect to receive offering envelopes. I asked Kelli Corts about the process and this is what our Parish Administrator shared, *"On the bottom of the pledge card each pledger has the option to request offering envelopes or not. It appears this household did indeed request envelopes and they will receive them on or before the last Sunday in December. In the meantime, if they would like to put an offering in the offering plate, they can use the blue pew envelopes. If it is a check, I will always gladly credit their account to ensure they received a giving statement at the end of each calendar year. We gave people this opportunity because so many have opted to use e-giving and the envelopes were becoming an unnecessary expense."* If you have similar questions please let me know.


Concert time



Engaging in a World of Difference

Study Tour to Istanbul - Turkey

June 5-17, 2014

This cross-cultural study tour aims to provide participants a first-hand experience of a Muslim-majority country and to expand their awareness of a different culture. Participants will attend lectures by Muslim and non-Muslim scholars. They will visit historic churches, mosques, and museums in Istanbul and meet leading figures of religious minority groups (viz., Jewish and Christian). The group will also make a trip to the cities of Nicea (Iznik) and Ephesus (Efes). Throughout, participants will have the opportunity to engage in conversations with Muslims in order to enhance their knowledge of Islam in its living dimension. **The trip is open to everyone.** Student participants enrolled in member institutions of the Washington Theological Consortium will receive 3.00 Graduate Academic Credits based on the assignments.

ISTANBUL



The estimated cost for the study tour to Turkey is \$1,600. This amount will cover all transportation within Istanbul, accommodation at the Istanbul Foundation for Science and Culture, meals, and entrance fees to various cultural/historical sites. The cost does not include the round ticket from Washington DC to Istanbul and any tuition charged by the home institutions.

Annual Giving Campaign Update


By the time you read this, we'll be in the final stages of Emmanuel's Annual Giving Campaign for 2014. In addition to being observed as All Saints' Sunday, **November 3 is also Pledge Sunday** where all pledge cards from the congregation will be presented and blessed during the Offertory. To those who have already returned their pledge cards – many, many thanks! To those of you who have yet to return your pledge, please be sure to bring them with you to the 8 or 10:30 AM services on November 3.

As you can see from the chart below depicting where we stand with this year's campaign, we've noted a marked increase in the number of new pledges and in the amount of the average pledge. However, we're still behind of our goal of 108 pledging units for next year so please be sure to either deposit, mail or drop-off your pledge card by the November 3 deadline.



Later in the month, Emmanuel's Finance Committee will begin drafting a 2014 for consideration and ratification by the Vestry and the amount pledged will have a significant impact on what is and isn't included in the budget next year. It is in all of our best interests that the Committee have the most accurate assessment of the anticipated annual giving level for 2014 in preparing next year's operating budget.

Christmas Eve Vigil December 24, 10:00 p.m. – for those who enjoy a quieter worship experience – Eucharist will be offered to all who choose to receive.


Christmas Day December 25, 10:30 a.m. – Eucharistic Service for those who want to celebrate on the day itself.

Comfort and Healing

New to EEC this year, Ryan Fitch, our Director of Music, would like to introduce us to what he describes as a comfort service. In Ryan's own words: "I know that Christmas seems like forever away, but I wanted to bring up an idea with you Chuck, before it gets too late. Christmas is full of wonderful music, family, friends, parties, shopping, and many wonderful memories for lots of people. However, sometimes Christmas is overwhelming emotionally for people who have suffered the loss of a loved one, dealing with an addiction, in bad health, or who are just desirous to celebrate Christmas in a quieter way. In the past I've been part of leading a Christmas Comfort Service, much like a healing service, and I think it's really wonderful. I am willing to organize the music for this, if you are willing to give a homily/ healing service elements."
