That feeds me and tells me that I am doing the right thing with the right people. Each of the brothers I encounter through my involvement joins me in my spiritual work. My life today is not the same as it was 23 years ago and it has most definitely changed for the better. Now I see God in all things and all people...still struggle with the lifelong problems of judging people and frequently forgetting to realize that God is with me at ALL times....the good and the bad. My friends and my family can tell you that I am not the same person as I was before the journey started.

Exercising my ministry I am open to all who are seeking to deepen their journey. Through mentoring, one-on-one conversations and through my participation in our local men's group, I try to be of value to each person I encounter. It is my strong belief that our work continues through real relationships that are personal and not through advertisements or cajoling anyone to do something I have done. I strive to be a servant to others in my involvements and do not seek out leadership position. My ego has deflated and more I take to heart what Fr. Richard says ..."Everything Belongs".

This is a community of men that I am proud to be associated with and who feed my spirit each time I gather with them...be it on an international scale, a national scale or in local groups. I cant' imagine returning to my life as it was – I am a better man for being part of this community.
