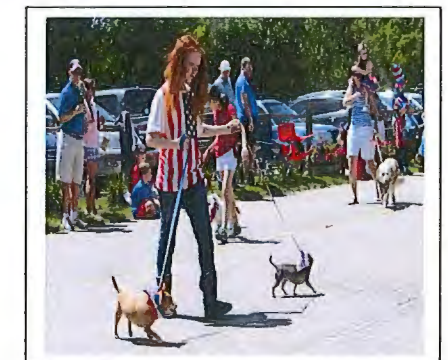
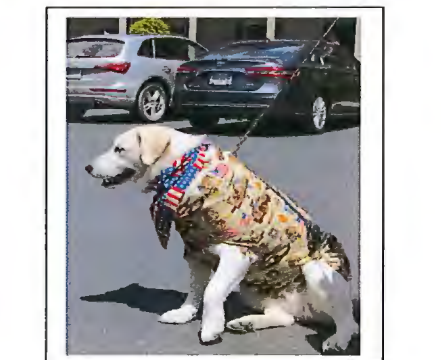
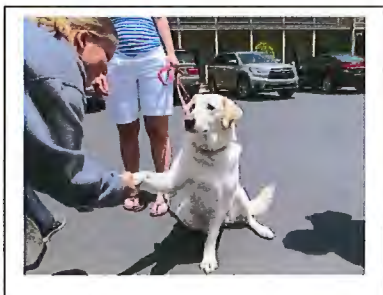

## Turf Talk by Scott Sparks

Three months have come and gone and we are halfway through the season just like that. Time flies when you are having fun, and that is true for us at the maintenance facility as we have thoroughly enjoyed trying to provide you with the best possible playing conditions play that we can. We also need your help during these busy months as June and July brought more play on the course which also means more ball marks and divots on the course. During Men's and Women's golf day in July we covered the correct way to fix a ball mark and repair divots. In case you missed it I will try and describe correct way of doing this. With a ball mark, the tool (tee, ball mark repair tool, etc.) is inserted at a 45 degree angle to the mark and then pulled into the center of depression, then tamped with putter or foot. Never lift up the depression as this pulls the roots from the soil and kills the plant. The USGA recommends in its code of ethics that each player should fix his or her ball mark and one more on the green. With divots on tee boxes and in fairways, just put enough sand to cover bare soil and smooth with foot. A heaping pile of sand damages the reel mowers that mow these surfaces, so less is better. If divot is big enough to live (> 1 inch) then just place back in hole and tamp with foot. Thank you for your cooperation in helping us to take care of your golf course.

The middle of June and July were somewhat dry and temperatures were on the rise, this led to us watering greens and green surrounds more than we have had to over the previous months. This consumed a large majority of our time so some projects that I hoped to complete last month were shelved to a later date. By the time you read this we will have already solid tine aerified the greens. During this time of year greens start sealing off, which means the top layer of soil is not allowing oxygen and other gases to exchange with the atmosphere. This can lead to decline of the grass, or even death. The holes opened by these tines allow for oxygen to move into root zone and harmful gases to escape. Another agronomic practice we will have completed is verticutting of the greens. This is done to remove thatch and excessive vertical growth on putting greens. Thatch is dead organic material from previously growing plants; this thatch can also lead to sealing off of greens. After verticutting we will apply a very light coat of sand to dilute this layer and to smooth up any defections in the putting surface.

## “Dining Reservations”

Over the past months, we have tried to encourage all Members to consider making reservations when they intend to dine at the Club. I'd like to devote this newsletter article to conveying why this is important and what you can expect whether you make a reservation or simply choose to dine at the Club on the spur of the moment.

Our Food and Beverage staff is committed to providing all Members with the finest dining experience possible. Whether you have a prior reservation or not, you should and can expect a fine meal.

That having been said, please understand that we are working very hard to control the Food and Beverage costs and minimize the potential for an operating assessment at the end of this year. Bobby, Kelly, Jeff, Kat and Sandy are highly focused on the need for cost control. We carefully manage our food purchases and daily staffing plans so as to minimize food waste and control serving staff expense. The number of dinner reservations we receive is the primary factor we use in planning our food preparation and serving staff needs. We plan that our patronage will be 20% above the reservations and that generally works well – but not always.

This year, we have placed emphasis on food and serving quality. Every entrée is individually prepared to order and we limit the number of people that will be seated at the same time to assure that your entrée will be served promptly after you place your order. Occasionally, our most popular dining times, typically between 6:30 and 7:30, are booked up well in advance. In these circumstances, if you do not have a reservation, we will seat you at the first available opportunity, but please understand that there may be a delay.

Additionally, we are very careful to not over-purchase the higher-end perishable food products that are often served on Fine Dining nights and as Specials. Although these selections are usually available to those arriving without prior reservations, there are times that that will not be the case.

Whether you dine at the Club with or without a prior reservation, you can be assured that we will do our best to make your dining experience enjoyable. If your plans allow, please make a reservation. If not, come and enjoy."

## Our Annual Hospice Event

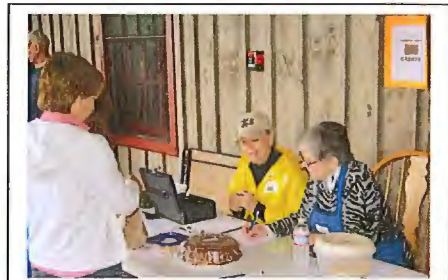

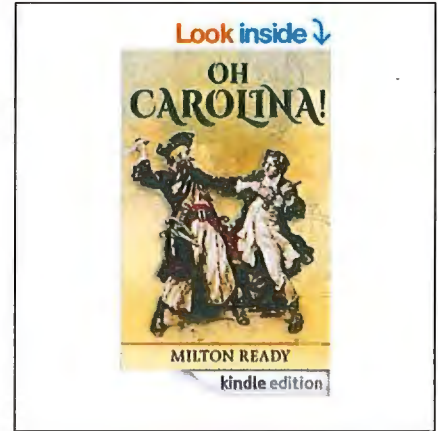

You are invited to a brief presentation on "Snake Handlers in Southern Appalachia" on Sunday, August 10th, at 5 pm at the Wolf Laurel Country Club to help launch Milton's two new books of fiction, one entitled "Snake Eyes" and the other "Oh Carolina!" Wine and cheese will be served. "Snake Eyes" centers on the murder of a family in South Georgia a few years ago by three teenagers, one a lone wolf, the other a sexual deviant, and the third an ordinary juvenile delinquent who quickly becomes a willing participant. What happens next provides a stage not only for murder but also for a series of events that, when mixed together in toxic form, comes up snake eyes for everyone involved. You won't know the form revenge takes and by whom until the last pages, and, yes, in the end, everything comes up snake eyes. Think of Truman Capote's "In Cold Blood" set in the Gothic South.

The second work, "Oh Carolina!" simply is a series of collected stories about life in the early Carolina's, North and South, as seen from the perspective of early settlers, pirates, slaves, and the seemingly endless Indian wars between whites and Tuscarora and Cherokee groups. Here think of Johnny Depp as Blackbeard the Pirate dashing around tall-masted ships fighting off just about everyone at Ocracoke in 1714, of Solomon Northrup in "Twelve Years a Slave" but with a graphic depiction of the murderous slave rebellion around Charleston and its tragic aftermath, and of Tsongus, a warrior chieftain of the powerful Cherokee tribe who surely will remind you of the last of the Mohicans only located here in western North Carolina. Together, these interrelated stories of early Carolinians will take you beyond what ordinary histories give you.

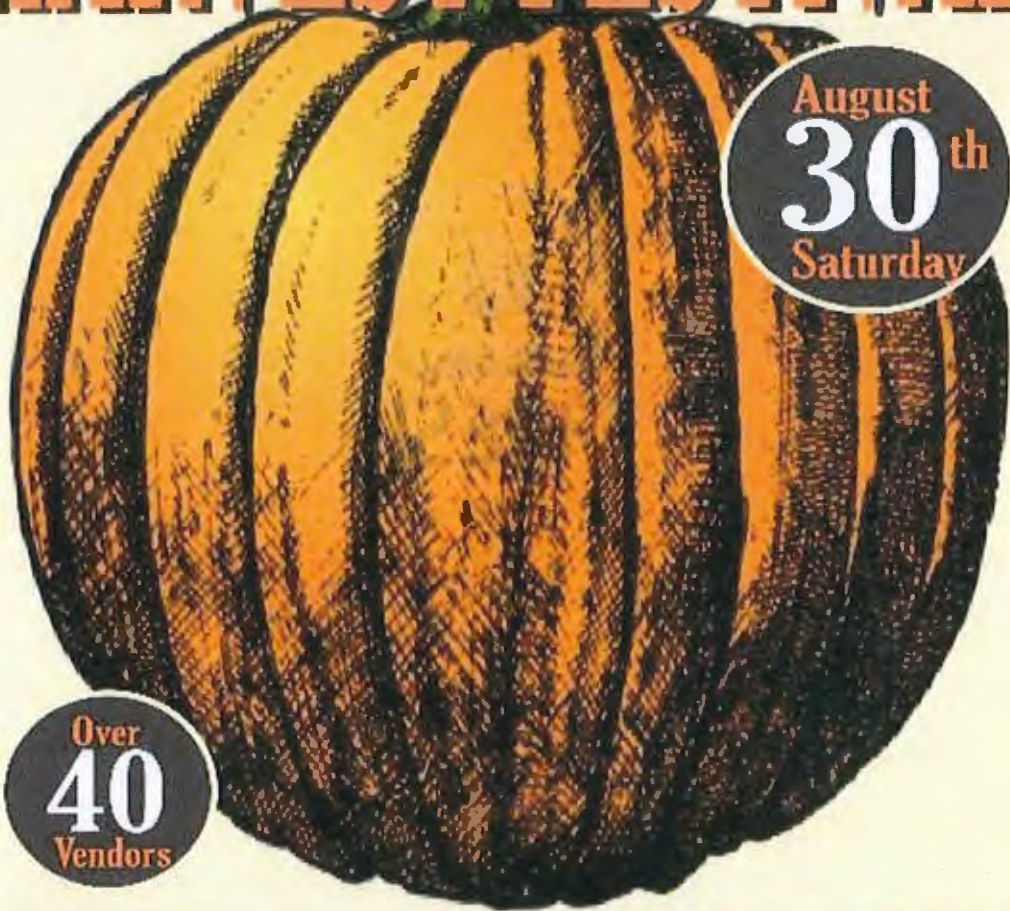
