Mission Statement

Dedication

The Guild of Volunteers dedicates the 2012-2013 Annual Report in memory of three treasured volunteers who passed away recently.

Bob Johnson became a docent for the Zimmerman House, not because of a strong interest in architecture, but because of his desire to meet people and embrace new experiences. Those who trained with him say Bob inspired spontaneous applause from his tour guests after leading his first Z-House tour. He is remembered fondly for his warm and gracious persona. Bob was married to Nancy, who is presently a museum docent and Guild chair for Meetings and Programs. Bob died at home Jan. 28, 2013, after a period of declining health. He was 69 years old.

Denise M. Johnson, a Guild of Volunteers emerita, died in North Carolina Nov. 26, 2012. Denise was Guild Executive Chair from 1996 to 2000 and a longtime museum docent. She was born in England in 1918 and came to the United States after WWII. She worked as an editor for Exxon's Geologic Organization and later as editor for Digital Equipment Corp. In addition to volunteering with the Currier, Denise served 15 years as Chair of Trustees of the Wadleigh Memorial Library in Milford. In 1992, she was named Library Trustee of the Year by the New Hampshire Library Trustees' Association.

Guild of Volunteers emeritus James A. Shanahan Jr. died Feb. 27, 2013, in Naples, Fla. Born in Manchester in 1926, Jim served in the U.S. Army in WWII, where he was wounded in the Battle of the Bulge and received the Purple Heart. He graduated from college after the war then earned a law degree and later became a certified public accountant. As a CPA and attorney, Jim's professional and civic accomplishments touched almost every aspect of Manchester life from Democratic Party politics to Manchester NH Housing Authority to The Derryfield School. Jim was a docent for the Z-House. He received a 20-year certificate at the 2012 Semi-Annual Meeting and Luncheon.

From the Executive Chair

The highlight of 2012-2013 was celebrating the Guild of Volunteers' 30th birthday at our Semi-Annual Meeting and Luncheon in November 2012. Chris Salmon created glass sun catchers decorated with the image of the Currier's *Ram Weathervane*. These were given as gifts to volunteers attending. Past executive chairs Jim Bennett, Sally Douglass and H. Frances Gordon regaled attendees with stories of past Guild ventures through the years.

The Guild Handbook revision committee, headed by Dennie Dyer, examined every position and operational function of the Guild of Volunteers and rewrote significant portions of the handbook. Thank you to Carolyn Hollman, Alan Slotkin and Victoria Duffy who served on the handbook committee interviewing current and past chairs, and writing, proofing and rewriting.

A third focus of the Guild's attention in 2012-2013 was the adaptation to a new computer program, Volgistics, for the recording and scheduling of volunteer hours. Volunteer records were imported into the new system in September 2012, and Guild members began using the system in June 2013. With extensive assistance from Staff Liaison Lynn Thomson, volunteers had the opportunity to attend one of four orientation sessions on the new program.

I want to thank outgoing chairs Ted Parrot, Treasurer, and Kim Tyndall, Membership, and welcome incoming chairs Angela Hoke, Treasurer and Nancy Baker, Membership.

I am honored to serve as your Executive Chair, and so grateful for the talented and dedicated volunteers who work at the Currier. You are amazing and an untold value to this museum. Your significant efforts are reflected in your 7,975 hours of volunteer time. Thank you so much.

Executive Vice Chair

This year's nominating and awards committee was headed by Dennie Dyer. On the committee were Alan Slotkin, Richard Russell, Victoria Duffy and Marilyn Davison who solicited and nominated a slate of candidates to serve on the Guild executive committee. They also recommended recipients for the Frances P. Nelson Award and the Distinguished Service Award.

Treasurer's Report

In 2013, the budget was increased from the previous year to allow for additional set-up and monthly operating fees and anticipated training expenses associated with the Volgistics software conversion. Fortuitously, the actual fees and training expenses were less than budgeted.

Cost of the annual meeting would have been higher than anticipated when the meeting was moved to the Bedford Village Inn from the Manchester Country Club, which could not host the meeting due to construction delays. By adjusting the menu, the total costs were comparable to previous years.

The food for the semi-annual lunch in the Winter Garden Café was under budget, allowing a gift of a 30th anniversary glass sun-catcher for each volunteer.

Total expenses for 2013 were \$4187, a savings of \$1187 under budget, but an increase of \$179 over 2012 expenses.

Guild Meetings and Programs

The Semi-Annual Luncheon and Meeting held Nov. 13, 2012, in the Winter Garden Café celebrated the Guild's 30th anniversary. Chris Salmon spoke on Glass Crafts. Arts and crafts made by 11 Guild members were exhibited at the luncheon and later in the Currier Community Gallery.

The 31st Annual Business Meeting and Luncheon was held on June 4, 2013, at the Bedford Village Inn. There were 87 people attending – 17 staff, two guest speakers, and 68 volunteers. Speakers on aspects of the Zimmerman House were Eric Stark and Terrence Parker. Carol Tingleff received the Frances P. Nelson Award and Beryl MacKenzie received the Distinguished Service Award. Guild Advisor Karen Graham was helpful in planning this event with committee members Sally Douglass, Yvonne Dunham, Muriel McMillan, Ann Richardson, and Nancy Stewart.

Guild Membership

The Membership committee was busy this year with the implementation of Volgistics software. Many thanks go to Kim Tyndall, who began the data entry work, and Melanie Larson and Barbara Shepler, who did much of the work of transitioning from the old system to the new. Volunteers are now able to schedule themselves for tours, log hours and review their profile. Volunteer records are up-to-date.

Fran Gordon retired after 31 years with the Guild. She is a founding member, was Membership and Communications chair, and Executive Chair from 1986 to 1988. She was a museum and Zimmerman House docent, and able to add depth to her Z-House interpretation due to her long history with the Zimmermans. She helped organize the 60th anniversary celebration for the Currier and her dramatic monologues won't soon be forgotten. Her painting, which hangs on the wall of the Guild room, will keep her present as we carry on a tradition she helped shape with her love of the Currier.

Roger Pascoe and Gay Zimmerman were awarded 150-hour pins at the June 2013 Annual Business Luncheon and Meeting.

Our numbers declined this year as nine volunteers retired and four new people -- Christine Bator, Laura Bourgeois, Brendan Burke and Sandra Superior -- joined the volunteer ranks. As of June 30, 2013, there were 101 active volunteers, 15 honorees, three furloughed and 12 inactive volunteers.

The total hours served during 2012-2013 fiscal year were 7,975. This represented an average of 92 hours for each of the 87 volunteers who recorded hours. This includes:

Guild Communications

The Currier Guild in Action newsletter was published five times between July 2012 and June 2013, reporting on activities of the executive committee, Guild events, volunteer opportunities, and other topics of interest to the Guild.

The newsletter continues to be distributed electronically. In 2013, the publication was converted from a Constant Contact document to a PDF document linked to a Constant Contact home page. The newsletter is also distributed to members of the Board of Trustees and Advisory Council. Past issues of the newsletter, the Guild of Volunteers Handbook and the Annual Report are archived online, accessible through links in each newsletter home page, as well as in the file cabinet in the Guild Room.

This committee edited and produced the *Guild of Volunteers Annual Report 2011-2012* in electronic and paper formats.

Special thanks to Alana Johanson for all her help this year with photography and slide shows. Special thanks also to Nancy McGaan and Victoria Duffy for assisting in the transition from Constant Contact to a Word PDF document. Also thanks to Nancy McGaan for production and photography; Victoria Duffy, Lynn Thomson and Karen Graham for editorial and proofreading assistance; Jane Seney, Bookshelf columnist; photographer Alan Slotkin; the Guild committee chairs for their timely and

interesting articles; and to Guild volunteers and Currier staff members who have contributed articles on various issues including Museum Seen contributors Pat Howard, Alan Slotkin and Diane Curran.

"Museum docents faced a huge new challenge in the past year leading tours through the special exhibition Lethal Beauty: Samurai Weapons and Armor. The show didn't connect to the museum's permanent collection and focused on a culture that was unfamiliar to many people. Museum docents embraced the challenge and integrated the wildly popular exhibit into their tours for school groups and adults. As always, your flexibility and love of learning carried us through this new challenge."

This year at the Zimmerman house we've had record-breaking attendance and many opportunities to explore the house through new lenses. Trainings focused on visitor experience and using questions to engage visitors. Z- House docents continued to provide high quality experiences for everyone on their tours. I am awed by their dedication and deeply appreciative of the time and energy they donate to giving tours. Thank you so much for all that you do."

Museum Docents

From July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2013, 45 docents provided a variety of tours and participated in museum programs serving the public. The numbers of museum tours and people served during the fiscal year include:

- 305 public tours for adults and students, offered six days a week
- School group tours for 6,429 students and 519 adults served by 469 docents
- 13 special group tours involving 27 docents

Docents took part in special Currier programs targeting groups of parents, children and adults. These include:

- New Parent Gallery Talks (monthly themed tours) led by 7 different docents
- Family Saturdays (monthly themed tours followed by an art project) served 846 family members with 6 docents
- 17 Focus Tours led by 13 docents

Docents also attended twice-monthly training and education sessions, and participated in other activities designed to enhance the effectiveness of tours. These activities and trainings include:

- Field trips to the Wadsworth Athenaeum, Mark Twain House, and Harriet Beecher Stowe House in Hartford, and Canterbury Shaker Village in Canterbury.
- Walkthroughs of museum special exhibits led by curators

- Trainings and additional practice in VTS (Visual Thinking Strategies)
- Guest speakers, demonstrators, and films related to special exhibits, the permanent collection, and field trips
- On-going education covering art history movements, artists, and works relating to the collection.

Zimmerman House Docents

Interest in the Zimmerman House continues to be strong. From July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2013, docents led 428 tours. There were 4,551 visitors, and most tours were sold out.

The regular public tour schedule was extended with a variety of focus tours. Jo Russavage gave her popular garden tour nine times throughout the season. Judy Ransmeier developed a new tour entitled “The Japanese Influence in Frank Lloyd Wright’s Design,” and reprised two favorites, “Fabrics and Furnishings” and “Evolution of Design” tours.

Docent meetings emphasized the visitor experience. They included:

- Best Practices in Touring (at the Z-House)
- Asking Questions, Managing Responses
- The Visitor Perspective on Tours
- An Architect’s Perspective on the Zimmerman House, with Bob Cook and Linda Moody

Three special events offered opportunities to socialize. Docents enjoyed a field trip to the Phillips Exeter Academy Library, followed by a potluck lunch at the home of Pam and Ted Parrot; a reception prior to Donna Grant Reilly’s ARTalk about her family’s Frank Lloyd Wright-designed Usonian house; and a holiday party celebrating the conclusion of tour season.

Conservation of the loggia doors posed an interpretive challenge from August until November. The doors were removed (in stages) for off-site treatment and temporarily replaced with plywood panels. Thanks to a positive presentation by docents, no visitor complaints were registered.

A new tour innovation debuted in May: an introductory video now can be viewed during the drive to the house. Richard Russell, Nancy McGaan, Carolyn Hollman, Judy Ransmeier, and Victoria Duffy worked with Jane Seney on the script.

Guild Library

"Where would I be without our volunteers? (Buried under a mountain of books to be sure.) This fiscal year has proved a busy one for the library and archives. Our ambitious and dedicated volunteer Jean McGiffin embarked on a comprehensive shelf-reading project of the entire library collection. Under Jean's direction, she and Mimi Crowley completed the tedious task of checking the shelf location of over 12,000 books. Jean's commitment to the project exceeded my expectations (and probably her own too). With over 30 years of cataloging under her belt, Gay Zimmerman was an invaluable addition to the library and archives. She corrected and updated over 2000 catalog records as part of the shelf reading and that was just one of the many projects she worked on. I learned a great deal from Gay and her careful and thoughtful approach. She was a true collaborator and will be sorely missed. We wish her the best of luck in Pennsylvania. Charlotte DeBell took on expanded responsibilities this year as the library and archives representative on the Guild of Volunteers board. Aside from all the e-newsletters, board updates and meetings, Charlotte continued her work with the museum archives and the Henry M. Fuller Collection. This is a tedious and time-consuming job and I sincerely appreciate her ongoing commitment. All this is saying nothing about the quiet commitment of the library and archives volunteers to the day-to-day operations that keep the collection up-to-date, orderly and ready for use."

- Preparing books for the Mother's Day sale
- Locating missing books, shelving books/periodicals and readying for bindery
- Confirming stack materials are in order/performing physical inventory.

- Arranging Art Center archives in support of the 2014 Art Center exhibition.
- Assisting Meghan with cataloging projects (has worked through the entire periodical collection to make sure catalog records are accurate and more accessible to users)
- Working on initial cataloging for the hundreds of volumes received from the David Carter Library in 2007, project completed
- Updating the on-line catalog
- Reading the shelves for missing books

Charlotte's projects have been:

- Rehousing, organizing and documenting the Henry Melville Fuller archives
- Serving as the Guild's Library Chair

Volunteers are our angels at the Art Center, and Pat Goss is an angel with a bonus. As a former art educator, Pat brings special talents along with her great attitude. She takes on office administration tasks with a smile, but she really shines in her warm interaction with students, family and staff. Pat is always willing to welcome and direct incoming students and parents on the first day of Vacation Camp weeks, bringing calm to first-day jitters.
