1. What type of organizations do you volunteer for?

I've volunteered for both organizations related to professional development of geologists and cross country ski organizations but am now focussing on the latter. I just finished a four year term on the Cross Country Canada board of directors. I've been involved in the Cross Country Saskatchewan (CCS) high performance committee for several years and am now on my fourth year as CCS HP Director. I've been on the Saskatoon Nordic Ski Club executive for eight years and am just finishing up a second term as President. Finally, I've gotten quite involved in officiating (currently a level 3 divisional TD) and have served at local races, Sask Cups, Westerns, Nationals, Canada Winter Games, Norams, World Cups and the 2010 Olympic Winter Games.
