Nearly 20 different groups and individuals will spread holiday cheer down Main Street Saturday, Dec. 6, for Absolutely Waterford's 16th annual Winter Wonderland Parade.

Kicking off at 5:30 p.m. from Associated Bank at 217 N. Milwaukee St., the parade brings the village to life with thousands of Christmas lights, fire blasts from a ReMax hot air balloon and marching bands

delivering sounds of the season to nearly 2,000 spectators along the sidewalk who are bundled for the occasion and sipping hot chocolate.

Absolutely Waterford President Mary Beth Mikrut said the parade is a must-see event.

Local attorney ready to breathe new life into building

For more than four decades attorney Michael F. Dubis has been practicing law locally, working from his busy Waterford office inside the historic, cream-city brick building at 208 E. Main Street.

Dubis came out to Waterford during his senior year at Marquette University Law School (he graduated sixth in his class in '72), to work out of attorney Nelson Johnson's office, one of four law firms in the town at the time.

"I liked the small, rural feel (of Waterford), as opposed to the congested (city)," said the Milwaukee native.

He had been offered several jobs in Milwaukee before and after he started his practice, but chose to remain in Waterford where he and wife Sandra bought a home and raised their children, Michael and Michelle – Washington-Caldwell and Waterford Union High School alumni.

In 1984, Dubis took the opportunity to purchase the building where he began his career in law.

"I'd already been renting for over 10 years and when Nelson Johnson passed away, it was just a logical place to stay," he said, noting that with little development in Waterford at that time, Main Street was the village's center of business.

While other attorneys eventually left town, Dubis Law Office grew its clients and credentials. Besides an impressive list of individual and municipal clients, Dubis has been named a Wisconsin Super Lawyer each year since the award began—an honor no other bankruptcy attorney in Racine, Kenosha or Walworth counties has received. The award is offered to only the top 5 percent of lawyers in the state. Throughout his career, he has served as a Trustee in Bankruptcy and is the senior Trustee in Wisconsin. He has also been



appointed by the Wisconsin Supreme Court as Referee and decides lawyer discipline cases. He has also published an historical-fiction novel based on World War II. Two subsequent novels will soon be ready for publication.

His firm includes an associate, two paralegals, a legal secretary, bookkeeper and contracted counsel representing the Town of Waterford and its sanitary district, Lyons Sanitary District; the Honey Lake Rehabilitation District, one bank, debtors, creditors and trustees, among others. On occasional Saturdays, he brings to the office his best friend, a wrinkle-faced English Bulldog, Lord Byron.

As owner of one of Main Street's longest running businesses with notable local history, the attorney

commended Absolutely Waterford for its efforts in revitalizing the historic downtown.

"I think what Absolutely Waterford is doing is good. I think it makes sense," he said.

As such, Dubis is the most recent to join the mission to preserve and revitalize the Downtown Heritage District, with plans for an upcoming façade improvement project to the law office.

The building dates back to 1898 when it was constructed by Attorney William Sanders just months following a fire that swept through downtown, destroying much of Main Street.

There, Sanders established Waterford's first bank, changing the way villagers did business in early years. Before the State Bank of Waterford, farmers, merchants and villagers had to hide money in their homes and travel long distances with cash in hand to make bank transactions. The bank, commissioned by the state on June 24, 1903, had a large steel safe and provided checks for instant receipts. The safe is still on site and proves to be a great conversation piece for the history buff.

With the lawyer's commitment to preservation, the historic charm of Dubis

Enhancing downtown pride

Commercial property owners improve the looks of their buildings through help of village's matching grant

For the past two years, more than a dozen commercial buildings throughout the village have gotten facelifts thanks to a matching grant program offered by the Village of Waterford.

Under the program, the village matched up to \$5,000 for façade work completed for individual eligible projects.

Grants can be used to fund improvements to the exterior front, rear and side facades and signs of buildings throughout the Village. Other eligible uses include painting, cleaning, awnings, materials, labor, entrances, window repairs, masonry work, architectural assistance, lighting, signage and roofs with decorative elements. Although it is not a requirement, it is recommended that the applicant consult with an architect regarding any structural or major façade renovation. In order to complete the application, grant seekers must schedule a meeting with the village building inspector at Village Hall to discuss the proposed project and any site plans developed.

The Curb Appeal Grant application is available at Village Hall, 123 N. River St., or at absolutelywaterford.org. Applications are reviewed and forwarded to Heritage District Design Committee. Businesses within the Downtown Heritage District must adhere to the Heritage District Design Guidelines, which can also be accessed at absolutelywaterford.org. The document contains pictures and references to the allowable materials, fixtures and sizes of building elements used to enhance the façade of any commercial building located in the Heritage Overlay District. Free architectural renderings are offered to business and property owners within the Heritage District. Services provided by a Wisconsin Main Street staff architect include color renderings, onsite and telephone consultations, sign design, paint and color scheme suggestions, awning designs, and other preservation-related information.

Law Office will be restored in just a few months.

In August, Dubis took advantage of getting a free architectural rendering done for improvements to his building. Using old photographs, Downtown Design Specialist Joe Lawniczak of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation, executed a drawing of the old bank that will certainly enhance Main Street. (See image on Page 3)

The service is one AW is providing as a Wisconsin Main Street designated-program, for buildings within the Downtown Heritage District that are seeking improvements.

After receiving the rendering, Dubis got to work seeking out bids for the project, choosing Diligent Services of Sullivan, Northrop Awning Co., Janesville; and SRS Roofing & Sheet Metal, Waterford to do the work.

Recently, Dubis Law Office was awarded nearly \$5,000 through the Village of Waterford's Curb Appeal matching grant program to help fund some of the improvements depicted in the rendering. Work is slated to begin this spring.

The facelift is one that Dubis acknowledged as necessary. "I knew the front of the building needed sprucing up. It should be done," he said of the project, which will include a cornice, new awning, cleaned bricks and painted window trim. With improvements that have taken place on adjacent buildings and a more pronounced intersection down First Street, Dubis wants his building to blend in nicely with the village scape.

He added that it also took some urging from close friend Pat Becker.

Dubis Law Office specializes in bankruptcy (debtor, creditor and trustee), bank representation, municipal, real estate and other fields. Dubis welcomes new clients even in areas that his office does not specialize in. He prides himself in the longevity of his relationships with clients, some of whom go back to the '70s.

residents and visitors downtown to take advantage of our many shops, restaurants, and businesses. And, we are lucky to have our parade marshals—Santa and Mrs. Claus."

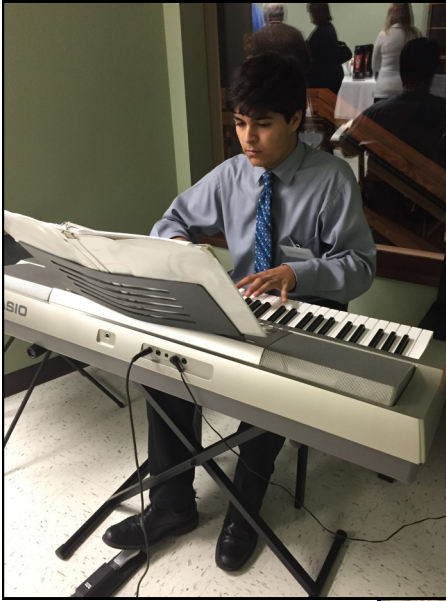
As with previous years, AW has received generous support from Runzheimer
