In her words, "I saw the emergency vehicles go by, prayed, not knowing our very own son was the cause of an unspeakable tragedy occurring nearby at that very moment." She describes herself as one who has walked through circumstances beyond her own ability to cope yet has found strength and even joy along the way.
