1 A Ethics: Pitfalls and Opportunities in Social Media

Presenter: Dr. Keely Kolmes

The Internet and social media offer a number of clinical and ethical challenges for those who provide face-to-face mental health services. These challenges include extra-therapeutic contacts between therapists and their clients, questions about what distinguishes personal from professional activities online, and a lack of clearly developed policies related to our online behaviors and interactions.

This course offers an introduction to digital ethics and to various social networking sites and activities. It summarizes recent research about interactions with clinicians and client online. It provides guidelines for anticipating and managing problems that may arise for practitioners. Applicable ethical standards will be addressed. The development of practice or institutional policies will also be addressed. A sample Social Media Policy will be provided to all attendees.

1 B Harm Reduction Expanded – Real Life, Real Talk, No Shame, No Judgment

Presenter: Grant Cobb

An intimate discussion about living, learning, growth and discovery - with a little bit of science and medicine. These sessions are open to Service Providers and Service Users;

We'll talk about:

- Morals! Mine? Theirs? What they expect me to say, what they expect me do, what I say, what I do.
- Sex. What they teach; what I found out on my own; sex when I was negative and sex now that I'm positive.
- Drugs; they feel good that's why they're bad. Is partying a real option?
- Condoms vs Reality it's natural, we are doing it; we should talk about it. Are there options?

Grant's goal is to create a barrier free place for a common language and understanding.

An understanding how bias and judgment interfere with our abilities to connect on real levels, both as service users and service providers.
