Freed from slavery, some of the precious few who were able to buy their own land created the community, Tamina, in 1871. Located along the railroad line between Houston and Conroe, they built their own churches, stores, and schools, tilled the land, raised hogs, and worked in the sawmills. Today, Tamina is one of the few remaining freedmen towns in the United States. Others have fallen to gentrification.

Although Tamina's story is steeped in history, few paragraphs have ever been published. *The Ground On Which I Stand*, is an exhibit with portraits and oral histories of the people of Tamina, representing different aspects of the community—young and old, black cowboys, ministers, those who have created non-profits to help their neighbors, those whose descendants helped establish Tamina, and those who have made Tamina their home within their lifetime. Their stories tell of a deep-rooted kinship with one another, with their values resting on family and community. Regardless of the challenges faced, their faith, gratitude, and humor always thread their tales.
