The Times They Are A Changing!

As we are poised to start a new year I am struck by how much progress we have made since the Center first opened it's doors. In 1997 autism was a low incidence disability. The number of families affected by ASD, has skyrocketed since then. The Center, which began with only the funding from the Department of Developmental Services began to do significant fundraising in order to meet the needs of so many new families. Being dependant on fundraising can be difficult when events do not generate the hoped for response. In order to serve increased numbers of families we are compelled to make some changes rather than cutting services families need. To begin, we are finding ways to cut costs. We're changing our software platform for event registrations, which will result in considerable savings. The new platform does not allow for a per family fee, so we will now have to charge a per person fee for activities. These fees will continue to be modest, but some events which are costly will have a slightly higher fee. The website registration page may have a different look but I'm confident you will be able to navigate it with relative ease.

We've gone from mailing welcome packets to families to sending the information electronically, resulting in a decrease in our operating costs and being a greener way to disseminate information. If you are receiving a paper copy of the newsletter and have e-mail, we request that you share that e -mail with the Center and help us by going paperless.

After 2010 when the passage of ARICA made it possible for families to obtain services for autism under their health plans we saw a downtick in the numbers of families who utilize the DDS funded Sensory Gyms and other therapeutic groups. We've since decreased the number of hours we offer these groups and have tried different offerings with minimal response. It is not a good use of our state funds to run groups for 2–4 children as the cost remains the same whether 2 or 10 children participate. Too often families sign up and attend 1 session and then do not return. We run the groups based on enrollment so those who do this may be denied funding for future groups, as it is OUR responsibility to utilize the funds from our State wisely. We understand that sometimes an activity is simply not a good fit so we're offering a "Sensory Sampler" so that families can "try on " different offerings and then settle on which is the best fit for their child.

We ask that parents make a firm commitment to attend the activities they register their child for and recognize that kids with ASD tend to resist novel experiences. As parents we need to be consistent with them, and attend so that they develop a comfort level with the activity and benefit from it. The cost for sensory activities will increase to \$50 /8 week session, which is less

1/2 the cost of what a sensory gym costs per child based on 10 participants. There will be no refunds for those who drop out from a group and we reserve the right to cancel a group if there are not sufficient participants. So if you enjoy the sensory gym format, talk it up and encourage others to enroll.

Those who request funding for a Social Skills group MUST inform the Center if they do NOT enroll their child, so that the funds can be allocated to another family. Failure to do so may result in being denied future funding.

Last year we were able to offer YMCA memberships for children on the spectrum. This was well received and we are offering them again through June 2014. Additionally we will be able to offer a month of Karate classes at specific studios. See page 3 for details. If your child is already enrolled in a martial arts class not listed, please call us to arrange funding for the class.

The idea is to give kids the opportunity to participate in a community activity which will enhance their ability to be interdependent and grow to be independent members of their community. Lots of changes, yes. However, the goals and mission of the Center remain the same. Working together we can improve the outcomes for this generation and pave the way for the future. Happy New Year!!

Autism Division Funded Groups And Community Inclusion Grants

Participants for all groups MUST be Autism Division eligible, and under the age of 18.

Social Skills

Those who would like to enroll their child in a Social Skills Groups with a clinician may apply for funding, up to \$300.00, towards a group session. Funds will be sent directly to providers, and families would be responsible for any fees beyond \$300.00. If a provider charges less than \$300.00, the fee will be covered in total by the funding. Funding for social skills groups is limited to eligible candidates under the age of 18 who meet the criteria for participation as set by the clinician. Contact the Resource Center to secure possible funding Swim and Safety Class with by calling 508-298-1609. If approved, your provider may invoice the Center for payment of \$300.00 for your child.

Sensory Gyms, Music, Swimming

These clinics are designed to require parent participation so that children have 1:1 supervision by a parent. Instructors are there to instruct and assist parents, not to provide direct supervision of children. Parents MUST stay at the location of the group. Please wear appropriate clothing for activities. Book Review—The Reason I Jump

The Reason I Jump written by Naoki Higashida, a thirteen year old with Autism is a bit different from books written by other people on the spectrum, in that this young man is non-verbal.

As the parent of a 5 year old who was non verbal in 1989 I was fortunate to meet Temple Grandin. I had read her book and was excited to be able to pick her brain. With typical lack of appreciation for the sensibilities of a young mother Temple was blunt and to the point, telling me that if my son was nonverbal at 5 chances were that he would not have an outcome that mirrored her life. This was crushing to me as a parent. But I remained determined and convinced of my son's intelligence, so I soldiered on.

This book is not a story of Higashida's life, it is done in a Q & A for-

mat, which is slightly off-putting at first, but then becomes fascinating as he answers various questions put to him about his behaviors, emotions and thought process. After a while it makes perfect sense that the book was written this way.

The questions run the gamut from "What's the reason you jump?" to "Should we listen to every word you say?" to "What's something people with autism really enjoy?" The answers may surprise you. Strong emotions "lock" his body so that he can't move the way he wants—jumping frees him of the ropes of the emotion. Listen to every word? Not every answer is reliable and it's frustrating for words to escape that aren't meant. What does he enjoy? Nature, his description of enjoying nature will touch you like a soft breeze can comfort you.

As the parent of a nonverbal man with autism, I know that his communication is not always verbal and over the years we've learned from each other how to communicate without words.

What struck me most was Higashida's oft repeated request that we be patient, and understand that the maddening things a person with autism might do are not designed to drive others mad, and that the actions are just as problematic for them.

His words encourage me to never ever give up and always to presume competence. Like others who have found a voice through typing some may doubt the veracity of his words. That is a mistake. His is a good message we should all heed.

Floortime® for Parents

The Autism Resource Center, in conjunction with the Astra Foundation will once again be offering a course on **DIR®** / **Floortime for Parents,** starting January 21, 2014.

DIR® is an abbreviation for Developmental, Individual Differences, Relationship-based. DIR® is a model—a framework—for thinking about a child's complete development, from infancy into whole joyful personhood. While DIR® can be a helpful way to think about any child's development, it is particularly useful in working with children with developmental delays.

In this course, we'll discuss the basic principles of DIR®, and learn about Floortime, a strategic, emotion-driven way of playing and interacting with a child that helps a child initiate and respond at higher and higher developmental levels. We'll also discuss the importance of understanding each child's unique sensory profile and how to incorporate this knowledge into Floortime sessions.

Participants will be provided with a copy of <u>The Child with Special Needs</u> as part of their registration fee. Due to popular demand this course will include the opportunity for parents to have 1:1 consultation with instructor Sarah Measures on three separate dates as the program progresses

One Family's Experience—Letting Go

My story is similar to many of yours.

My firstborn is a boy. As a new parent, I might have been a little neuroticalways trying to make sure he had a nutritious diet, disinfecting every little thing, and the list goes on.

Seventeen months later I had my second child. I believed the adjustments & changes to the home caused my son's lack of social and communication skills. We started early intervention, and by 18 months old they recommended that he be evaluated for autism.

In 1998, autism was not something I had ever even heard of. It was devastating. My husband and I started weaving through the therapies, interventions and how to advocate as best we could. Cal worked really hard with numerous therapists for hours daily. Some years, he was in a specialized outplacement schools. Thankfully, he acquired a lot of skills, like showering, brushing his teeth, tying his shoes, some basic reading and math skills.

He still struggled with his communication and expressive language, which escalated his aggressive outbursts and self-injurious behaviors. As the teen years approached these behaviors intensified and became more and more unsafe. The thought of a residential placement was something that I respected other parents for doing, but a choice I wanted to avoid and thought I would never have to make.

In 2010, I had my third child, unaware she would be born with Down Syndrome and a heart defect. She had

open heart surgery at two months old, and through this period my son was stable. When she was around nine months old, his behaviors once again became a crisis in the home. When we could for see an outburst coming, I would have to hide the other children in a room.

Sometimes these outbursts came unexpectedly, and furniture and objects would be thrown, making holes in the



walls, sometimes just missing us. He had many sleepless nights of pacing, and he needed constant supervision, as he was very good at sneaking off and wandering. Most of the time I was alone and felt exhausted, vulnerable, unsafe and desperate to keep him and my family safe.

In our desperation, we placed him in and out of a psychiatric hospital, and we came to the decision that he needed a residential setting. I had to advocate with the school district that this would be best for him also. This process took about a year.

For about a year and a half he has been in his new placement. The hardest

thing I ever had to do was letting go. He is my first child and I had to let go of him earlier than I expected.

For 15 years, everything we did as a family was based on his needs, and now we've started seeing each other's needs more.

Through letting go we were able to grow. We've had to learn a different way to be a family. We are able to start putting energy and time into each other in a healthy balance.

Our time together with Cal is quality time, and now we are also able to enjoy each other. Cal has adjusted mumore quickly than I anticipated. He seems more confident and happy.

Through a daily consistent routine and trained, compassionate staff, he has been doing chores, community activities, biking and hiking along with his peers. This progress is a joy to see, especially as it was a struggle when he lived at home even to get him out of his room.

I encourage you not to wait until there is a crisis in your family before you make this decision. Some of you are going to have to make this decision. In our desperation, we placed him in sooner or later. You are not alone.

Letting go was one of the hardest things I had to do. Through prayer and support from my community, we were able to get through it. The rewards far outweighed the initial pain. *****
