This year, we enthusiastically pursued these goals as we organized and participated in scholarly conferences and symposia, volunteer opportunities, and social events.



Sigma Tau Delta members have a wonderful opportunity to present their scholarly work each year at the Sigma Tau Delta Annual Convention. The selection committee receives a competitive pool of submissions, and we were very proud to have two students selected to represent UWF at this year's convention in Savannah, Georgia. M.A. candidate Laura Herbek presented a series of original poems titled "A Crooked Hunger" and senior Rebecca Steward presented a critical paper on the *memento mori* tradition in John Donne's poetry. Both Laura and Rebecca received insightful questions and positive feedback from audience members. Plus, we had fun! In February, Sigma Tau Delta students volunteered at Open Books, a non-profit, volunteerrun bookstore in downtown Pensacola that sends thousands of books each year to indigent inmates in Florida prisons.
