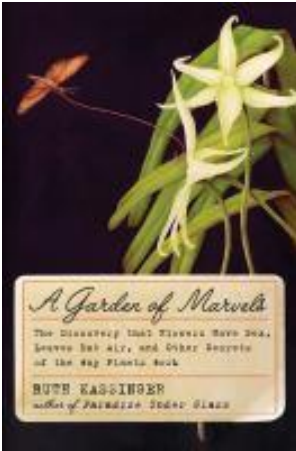


## Tower Hill Botanic Garden New Books in the Library: March 2014
