## **Morning Keynote**

Play To Talk

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**Dr. James MacDonald** has spent 40 years focusing on how parent child relationships can help children become interactive, communicative, socially linguistic, conversational and learn to behave civilly. As professor at the Ohio State University he taught students of several disciplines, conducted 18 years of federal research grants, and personally provided clinical services to over 1000 late talking children. He taught academic and clinical courses to over 3000 students, professionals and parents. His focus has been on preverbal, early verbal children and children with signs of autism, develop-

mental delay and behavior issues. In that time he developed a responsive teaching model now called Communicating Partners. For an overview, see the website at www.communicatingpartners.com.

Since his early retirement from OSU in 1996, he has developed the Communicating Partners center for parent child coaching. He also has written three books, Communicating Partners, a developmental text; Play to Talk, a home program; and Autism and Developmental Disabilities, an early intervention curriculum. He and several parents manage a Yahoo internet group called Communicating where they interact with parents and professionals almost every day at no cost about communicating disorders. His major finding has been that children learn best in matched and responsive relationships with their life partners.

# BECOMING COMMUNICATING PARTNERS WITH CHILDREN Dr. James MacDonald

This Keynote will begin with a number of contrasting relationships with late-talking children. They illustrate social responsive approaches compared to a directive academic one. The overall theme of the session will be that the most effective approach to social and communicative development is ensuring the child has highly frequent interactions with possible and playful persons.

This session will focus on how you can help children socialize and communicate in everyday relationships. Dr. MacDonald will discuss his clinical, research and internet experience with families and professionals. Children include infants at risk, as well as children with diagnoses or suspicions of Autistic Spectrum Disorders, developmental delays, behavior problems, late-talking children, and typical development. Many common myths that interfere with development will be presented with a range of common problems in children, their life partners and their environments.

The ARM (Adult-child Relationship Map) assessment and program planning for five developmental stages- Interactions, Communication, Language, Conversation and Civil Behavior will be presented.

You will learn five lifelong strategies to build your child's social and communicative life. Case stories of parents' experiences will demonstrate successes. Video examples will illustrate the program with a range of children.

## **Afternoon Keynote**

**Dan Richason** has been working with families, educators, service providers and children for 24 years. He earned a Masters Degree in Education and is the co-founder of System 1-2-3, a regional leader in the design and execution of teacher and system development solutions for early childhood education. He is also the principle author of System 1-2-3's Pyramid Building Project, a comprehensive approach to building and sustaining the capacity of early childhood programs to develop the social and emotional competencies of children.

#### COMMUNICATING THROUGH CONFLICT

Dan Richason

This keynote will focus on effective communication skills to address the inevitable conflicts of early childhood education. Potential conflicts explored will include role definition, routine activities, and responding to challenging behavior.

Communication skills highlighted will include listening for understanding, professional sharing and collaborative processes.

#### **1A Building Communicative Relationships with Nonverbal Children**

Dr. James MacDonald

Children need to do many things before they develop talk-skills that are often omitted in therapy and education. additionally, their parents and professionals will succeed to the degree that they enter the child's world with several proven strategies, rather than focusing on goals before their time. The session will summarize over 40 years of helping nonverbal children become first, interactive, then communicative and only then verbal. Too many children are being rushed to language only to fail when they are not helped to be interactive and communicative first.

You will identify the developmental goals children must reach before they develop socially effective language. You will also learn five lifelong strategies that prepare children or social language. Common problems will be presented with ways to address them. Among the goals needed before language are social play, imitation and modeling, and reciprocal turntaking as nonverbal communication with actions and sounds. You will learn to use the ARM (Adult-child Relationship Map that shows how to use the program.

Helping Tools to Improve Participation for Young Children (Their Families and Teachers) 1B

#### 1C Range of Responses to Children: Awareness and Action

This presentation will engage participants in reflection about how they respond to children. The facilitator will use System 1-2-3's Range of Responses continuum, which includes Anger, Frustration, Disappointment, Neutrality, Satisfaction, Pleasure, and Enjoyment to help audience members be aware of their potential and normal ranges as well as to take action to develop a new normal.

#### 2A Building Social Language, Conversation and Civil Behavior in Verbal Children

Dr. James MacDonald

Language is not enough. Too many children have language but little genuine communication and conversation. They often do not have some of the civil habits that society requires. It is a myth that all a child needs for a conversational life is a large vocabulary. This session will make a vital distinction between academic or needs-based language and a socially effective conversational language. It will focus on many social goals a child needs for communicative relationships.

It will also show you how to use everyday strategies to help children become conversational and socially appropriate. The importance of civil behavior will be stressed since it is often a child's lack of civil behavior, such as cooperation, empathy, and self-regulation, that excludes him from society. You will learn to use the ARM (Adult-child Relationship Map) to identify appropriate goals and strategies and how to measure progress.
