



greater Northwest, Crooks was able to create a catalog of Lange pieces drawn out West.


During his time in Washington, Lange created hundreds of works done in pen-and-ink, watercolors, and oil on canvas. His works were used as business letterhead, illustrations in newspapers, posters, pamphlets, real estate advertising and post cards to name a few. They show in great detail what life at the end of the 19th century looked like in Olympia.
