- a lay or clergy leader of any gender, race, or ethnicity (including Euro-American) who seeks to explore new ways of reaching out to the growing diversity in your neighborhood, or even a beginner who wants to learn the basics of becoming a multicultural church (from A to Z) by exploring multicultural worship, mission, discipleship and power sharing.
- a minister of a multicultural church and wish to grow your church deep and wide, renew your commitment to this ministry, network and fellowship with other colleagues, and explore more models of doing ministry.
- a mid council executive or church professional who wants to explore new ways of church planting and revitalization in a diverse setting, and wants to go deeper in your understanding of cultural proficiency, race and ethnic dynamics.
- a teaching elder or a commissioned ruling elder who is just starting a new fellowship or new worshipping community and wants to grow in your understanding of diversity, and wishes to get tools to help understand the dynamics of demographic change and population shifts.
- a faculty member, seminarian, or Christian educator who wishes to discuss contemporary theological studies and their implications to ministry in a changing landscape.
- a member of a sister congregation in another denomination which wants to explore ecumenical partnership, and wants to network with national and global partners in ministry.
- an advocate who cares about equality, justice and peace in your community and wants to learn more about prophetic and compassionate witness.
- a new immigrant, an immigrant congregation, or a hosting congregation in partnership with a new immigrant congregation, who wishes to learn more about team building and dynamics of cross cultural relationship or church policy towards immigration.
- a member of a multicultural or cross-cultural family, or a pastor or friend to emerging cross-cultural families.
- a person who simply desires to “do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God” (Micah 6:8), enjoys the fellowship of others, and seeks new insights and rich experiences of the Spirit.



Keynote Speakers

Rep. Stacey Y. Abrams is the House Minority Leader for the Georgia General Assembly and State Representative for the 89th House District. She is the first woman to lead either party in the Georgia General Assembly and is the first African-American to lead in the House of Representatives. She co-founded and acts as senior vice president of the NOWaccount Network Corporation, a financial services firm. Abrams also co-founded Nourish, Inc., a beverage company with a focus on infants and toddlers. In 2012, she received the prestigious John F. Kennedy New Frontier Award, which honors an elected official under 40 whose work demonstrates the impact of elective public service as a way to address public challenges.



Dr. Luis Rivera-Pagán has a PhD in theology from Yale University and is a professor of humanities at the University of Puerto Rico. He also serves as adjunct professor of theology at the Evangelical Seminary of Puerto Rico. His wife, Anaida Pascual-Morán, is a visiting scholar at Princeton Theological Seminary, and a graduate school professor in education at the University of Puerto Rico. Luis and Anaida share a blended family of six grown children, a Spanish-speaking German shepherd, and a commitment to academic careers that are fully engaged with the modern struggles of Latin American life. Rivera-Pagán's intellect and academic training have pushed him out into the world rather than keeping him cloistered in the library.



Rev. Dr. Joseph J. Clifford serves as pastor and head of staff of First Presbyterian Church of Dallas, Texas, a vibrant congregation in the heart of downtown. The church is best known for its community ministry with the homeless and with children and youth who live in poverty. Prior to coming to Dallas, Clifford served two congregations in the Atlanta area, Stockbridge Presbyterian Church (1997–2000) and Alpharetta Presbyterian Church (2000–2006). He is a graduate of Columbia Theological Seminary and received his DMin in preaching from McCormick Theological Seminary. The son of two public school teachers, Joe grew up in the Washington, DC area. He and his wife, Jennifer, met at Auburn and are the parents of John and Kate.



Rev. Dr. Jooseop Keum is the secretary for the World Council of Churches Commission on World Mission and Evangelism. Keum is an ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church of Korea and has a PhD in mission and ecumenism from the University of Edinburgh. He is the chief editor of the International Review of Mission. He is also an adjunct professor of missiology at the Presbyterian Theological Seminary and College in Seoul, Korea.

P-1 Presbytery/Church Leadership Team Training

JT-1 Multicultural from A to Z (MC 101)

This is an in-depth track designed for individuals contemplating a step into multicultural ministry, in the beginning stages of initiating a new worshiping community, a new church development, or the transformation of a congregation from mono-cultural to multicultural. Each can be challenging. So if you are a starter or have been facing difficulties moving forward, this track is for you. We will be using models based on successful ministries in this area, offering tips on what has worked in other places, reviewing mistakes that have been made, and learning from one another in collaborative ministry. You will have some time for small group work that will seek to address your particular situation. We will be using biblical, theological, and spiritual tools throughout our time together.

JT-2 Transformational Leadership for the 21st Century

The world is growing more diverse and more complex. Today’s church lives in a world that is changing ideologically and technologically by the minute. Rapid demographic shifts and population changes are providing constant challenges and opportunities and are the dominant force in all aspects of life in today’s world. The discovery of a new paradigm shift in leadership development is not only necessary but urgently needed to take us to where we will become a united body in which outsiders and insiders are equal partners in shaping its present and future. In this workshop we will share models of ministries of justice and the leadership qualities needed to make them happen, provide tools for innovative and holistic leadership that unite and incorporate differences, build bridges, and bring innovation and growth.

JT-3 Migration and Emerging Ministries: Tools for Supporting Congregations

We invite you to a time of praying, information sharing, discernment, and interactive discussion. Come to hear about ministries within and affiliated with the church, legal service, church policies, and emerging ministries supporting immigrants. Come ready to share what your faith body is doing to serve the church and the community in this area.

JT-4 Models of Multicultural Ministries

leaders, the pastors of these congregations will focus on both the power sharing and reconciliation that successful multicultural churches need and the practical side of what it means to be a multicultural community in ministry. Speakers will tell the stories of their respective congregations, highlighting many and various examples from worship, service, fellowship, Christian education, and community building within their congregations. Participants will have the chance to interact with the leaders in small- and large-group settings and will take away useful and inspiring examples that can be applied to different church contexts, challenges, and opportunities.

JT-5 Justice and Power Dynamics

How do we authentically and thoughtfully share our faith in a diverse and multicultural setting? How can we effectively share the gospel in our ever-changing cultural landscape? How can we be a part of not only the transformation of individuals, but also the transformation of our neighborhoods and communities?

We will look at how to become missionaries to our communities, sharing with others who may be from a different racial or ethnic background. We will hear about emerging methods and models for being church in a new way. We will talk about developing

multicultural leadership, missional ministry (that is, joining God in what God is already doing in your neighborhood), developing disciples who have a heart for multicultural ministry, offering worship gatherings as a means (not a hindrance) to reaching the un-churched, and articulating the gospel message in a post-Christian and culturally diverse context. Participants will take back ideas and tools to help them make the shift necessary to become more effective in developing disciples, seeing transformation in lives and communities, and living out Christ's Great Commission to "Go and make disciples of all nations"

Come and explore how our churches can engage in evangelism, discipleship, and missional life in our multicultural communities.

JT-9 Where are the young people? Creative and practical ways to reach the elusive post-Boomer generations

The mainline church has little that the post-Boomer generations find appealing – not the self-importance, the safe middle-class feel, the homogeneity, the cultural inwardness. Young people today are searching for meaningful vocation, healthy relationships, genuine Christian community, social and global consciousness, and a tactile faith. This track will equip participants to understand better and be more equipped to minister in this emerging context.

JT-10 Global Perspectives on Power and Privilege

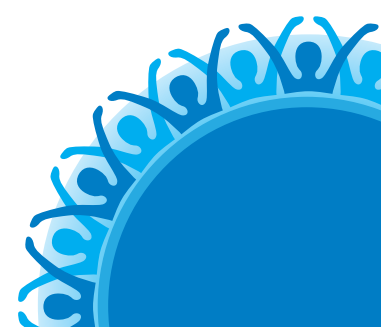
Co-sponsored by board members of the Ecumenical Network for Multicultural Ministries [ENFORMM-NA (North America) and ENFORMM-International]

Using interactive exercises and dialogue, we will explore power and privilege and how it impacts The United Church of Canada, the United Church of Christ (USA), the Uniting Church of Australia, and the Presbyterian Church USA.

JT-11 Youth (ages 7-12) Sue Suneson, Ken Richardson, Lauren Black, Jennifer Friedel, Cynthia Petty

This track is for elementary school children. This interactive experience will model and explore God's love and show that an early journey with Christ leads to a life full of blessings and empowerment for self, family, and community. Leaders will guide children through activities such as music, arts, drama, technology, storytelling, and community experience.



Registration
