HISTORY & SOCIAL SCIENCE ACADEMIC COURSES

HIST121 1914-2014: Echoes of the Guns

New!

This course will be of the history the Great War, 1914-1918, focusing on the causes and consequences of the war in France, Germany and Great Britain. Daniel Guy and Linda Stevenson will team-teach, utilizing lectures on their individual areas of expertise, and presenting the best films of the conflict, including the classic "All Quiet on the Western Front", based on the novel by Erich Maria Remarque, Universal, 1930 (digitally remastered and fully restored from high resolution 35MM original film elements) as well as the 1957 masterpiece of Stanley Kubrick "Paths of Glory", and the British and French silent films produced during and immediately after the conflict, "The Battle of the Somme, 1916", and "J'Accuse", 1919.

Tu 1:00—3:00PM 9/9/2014—11/11/2014

Instructors: Daniel Guy is a lifetime student of the history and literature of war and conflict as well as a former Army officer. He previously taught "Voices From the Trenches" on the poetry of the First World War.

Linda Stevenson is a retired professional college educator of humanities courses, studying as well as teaching in France, China, Southern Oregon University and Rogue Community College. She has

enjoyed OLLI@SOU classes for several years, but this will be her first experience teaching since her retirement.

HIST135 2014 House and Senate Congressional Elections

This is a discussion course of the 2014 House and Senate Congressional elections, with some time spent on selected governor's races. We will discuss issues, candidates, campaign strategies, campaign consultants and fundraising. Time will also be spent on developments in Congress as the campaign progresses. November classes will include discussion of winners and losers, what issues appeared to drive the election and what the election results mean for the country.

He led political discussion groups while serving as deputy and acting director of the Institute of Politics at the John F. HIST122 2014 US Supreme Court at Work

In this 6 week lecture course we will review and put into historical context several current decisions by the US Supreme Court, announced in the spring and summer of 2014. All class members are again encouraged to read the U.S. Constitution and Amendments prior to the first class. No other texts are required.

Beginning with Lee's withdrawal from Gettysburg we will look at the combat actions in the various theaters, paying attention to the command conflicts, weaponry, terrain, and personality conflicts involved.

HIST126 Hammurapi's Code

New!

Western Civilization is indebted to the east Mediterranean world for its major accomplishments. C. H. Gordon notes that Hammurapi was not the first ruler of Mesopotamia to issue a collection of laws, but his code (dated around 1704-1662 BCE) is so far ahead of anything previously attempted that we must regard it as the apex of legal codification prior to Roman Law. This code gives us an accurate picture of Babylonian society, which was a major contributor to the culture of the east Mediterranean world. This world provided the common background for both the Hebrew and Greek culture.

This is the second class on the Cold War including the Cuban Missile Crisis, Vietnam, MAD Doctrine, Chicago Convention of 1968, Red Spring of Czechoslovakia, China, Detente, Central and South America, Nuclear Freeze and President Carter, and Afghanistan. Each week a live-footage film and discussion. We have lecture, discussions, chalkboard and much interaction. General knowledge of Cold War helpful but not required.

HIST128 Introduction to the Renaissance

Between the 14th and 17th centuries in Western Europe, beginning in Italy, the Medieval world largely disappeared but the Modern world had not yet fully established itself. This in-between time gave rise to many of our greatest cultural achievements. To name a few: the fine art of da Vinci, Michelangelo, and Durer; the writings of Shakespeare, Cervantes, and Rabelais; the scientific breakthroughs of Copernicus, Galileo, and Harvey; the reflections on the human condition of Montaigne, Machiavelli, and Francis Bacon; the religious reforms of Luther, Calvin, and Ignatius Loyola; and the voyages of de Gama, Columbus, and Magellan. We will try to understand in a broad sense this cultural flourishing and what gave rise to it.

F14HIST128M 8 Sessions Higher Education Center—Room 118 W 1:00—3:00PM 9/10/2014—10/29/2014

Instructor: Herbert Rothschild trained in textual studies at Yale (BA 1961) and Harvard (MA 1963, PhD 1966), and taught 22 years in the English Department at Louisiana State University, where he also directed the Honors Program. His last appointment was as visiting professor in The Honors College at the University of Houston. Specializing in Renaissance literature, he published numerous scholarly articles in that field. For the general reader he recently brought out a book on Shake-speare called Profoundly Entertaining.

HIST129 Selected Bioethical Problems

After a description/discussion of bioethical principles (week 1), each class will present a different problem (1-2 page problem description available beforehand by email). Students will form groups of approximately 5-7 people to discuss the problem and develop a proposed solution. The solutions will then be presented to the full class which will discuss them again to determine which are both consistent with bioethical principles and embody best public policy.

HIST130 Strange Ideas: Philosophical Thought in 19th Century Europe

The lectures in this course will explore the diversity of 19th century European philosophical thought in historical context. We will start by tracing a variety of reactions to the work of Kant: Fichte, Schelling, Hegel, Schopenhauer, Marx, the British Hegelians. Next comes the work of Bentham and Mill in England. Finally come Kierkegaard and Nietzsche, the precursors of the 20th-century existentialists,

This class is aimed at non-lawyers: people who would like to learn about certain aspects of the legal system from a lawyer's perspective. I will provide short outlines for certain topics that will be on the website (history of law, criminal law, torts, corrections, contracts, family law, property, probate, or constitutional law) and should be read before each class. In class, we'll discuss each area of law, as well as current events relating to it.

The class will be primarily one of lectures, but because each legal principle discussed may relate to current events of interest, the instructor will encourage class questions and discussions. We'll look at the development of musical notation and forms (chant, mass, motet, madrigal, chanson, and others), and listen to works by Hildegard of Bingen, Perotin, Leonin, Machaut, Du Fay, Ockeghem, Josquin, Palestrina, Gesualdo, Marenzio, Morley, Gabrieli, and others. No previous musical background is necessary.

These three men, all closely related, friends from childhood, ruled vast empires that co-existed peacefully for most of the late 19th and early 20th centuries until they blundered into a cataclysmic war that destroyed two of the empires, and ended with one man and his family murdered and a second forced into exile. We'll examine their lives through lectures and excellent video material.

This class meets for four sessions every three weeks. It will be conducted as a discussion of the themes, characters, relationships, and historical setting of the following books: (1) Nobody Knows the Spanish I Speak by Mark Saunders, the humorous story of a suburbanite couple that move to Mexico in search of happiness; (2) We Band of Angels by Elizabeth M. Norman, an account of American nurses in Japanese captivity during WWII; (3) One Day of Life by Manlio Argueta, which depicts a typical day in the life of a peasant family during the 1980s civil war in El Salvador; and (4) No Future Without Forgiveness by Desmond Tutu, the story of South Africa's move from despotism to democracy by exposing the atrocities committed in the past while achieving reconciliation with its former oppressors.

Featured will be the works of Lyly, Peele, Greene, Kyd, Marlowe, and a chap named Anon. The Elizabethan business of show business will also be revealed. (This will not be a course about Shakespeare but around him.)

Students will read aloud The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society by Mary Ann Shaffer and Annie Barrows. This "epistolary" novel consists of letters, notes, and telegrams exchanged among many individuals in Great Britain immediately after World War II. Students needn't read the book in advance. Instructor will determine beforehand how much/little each student wishes to read. Each class will begin with a brief lecture (historical/literary background) and conclude with Q & A/discussion.

In Class 2 of Anthro is Fun!, we will explore the first bipedal hominins at around 8 millions years ago, through Ardipithecus and Ramapithecus, the 22 species of Australopithecus, and ending with the various early Homo species, including Homo neandertalensis. We end at the dawn of Homo sapiens. Material includes what they ate, where they lived, material culture and tools, how they thought, when language first emerged, the dawn of fire-taming and home bases. Along the way we will explore whether the Paleo Diet accurately reflects ancestral hominin diets. You will also learn the difference between hominin and hominid.

SCI110 Carbon Pollution, Climate Change and Rogue Consequences

The course will address the basic science of carbon pollution and climate change, its physical and biological consequences, local trends and projections, what we can do, and the science relating to climate denier claims. The format will be presentation discussion using PowerPoint based presentations.

Course description: What is Chaos Theory all about? Things in our daily lives certainly don't seem chaotic: we are able to balance our checkbook, trains stay on the tracks, the positions of the moon and planets can be forecast far into the future with great accuracy. So where is the chaos? This is challenging material which we will explore together. The course will use the 24-lecture course by Steven Strogatz (published by The Teaching Company in 2008), who is widely published in the areas of chaos, complexity and networks. Each session we will watch three ½ hour lectures with breaks between for questions. Count on each session lasting $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours. 8 sessions. No mathematical skills are needed.

First we'll take a brief visual tour of the coast and the Cascadia Subduction Zone to illustrate the creative forces that continue to form and shape our land, followed by classes featuring more local geologic sites such as Lassen Volcanic NP, Mt. Ashland, and Crater lake.

SCI113 How Animals Work: Tactile and Visual Senses

The brain gathers, stores, retrieves, transmits and generates information. We will explore the gathering of information by touch receptors and the visual brain of humans and a variety of other animals. The touch modality will be used to introduce how neurons function and code. For humans, vision is the most most important means of acquiring knowledge about the world. We will use an experimental approach tracing behavioral and physiological experiments begun in the 1930's on "simple animals" that reveal how visual systems operate. No text is required, but the instructor will provide an online syllabus and links to be printed and read.
