Each year in the US, we bury:

- 4.3 million gallons of embalming fluid (827,060 gallons of which is formaldehyde)
- 64,500 tons of steel
- 20 million board feet of hardwood for caskets
- 1.6 million tons of concrete

Embalming fluid/formaldehyde

The original amount of 827,060 gallons referred to formaldehyde in the embalming fluid, not embalming fluid itself: embalming fluid is 2-4% formaldehyde — that would be about 4.3 million gallons. Note that while the science is out on the danger to groundwater contamination...one thing's pretty clear: it's not good for morticians' health — they breathe the stuff. Which is the main reason the GBC says no embalming fluid except for one product made entirely of essential oils.

Metal/Hardwood/Concrete

Because cremation is spiking, metal caskets are tanking. Now we're at 64,500 tons of steel instead of 104,272. Copper and bronze I'm not sure of; they're such a small part of the market I just ignored them this time around. Back in 2001, 30 million board feet of hardwoods in caskets — that was the trickiest stat I had to track down; I actually found numbers ranging from 30 to 60 million board feet and, being a science writer, opted for the conservative figure. Now it looks to be about 20 million board feet: fewer caskets (cremation again) and manufacturers using thinner stock (trying to save money — and geez, you don't need two- or three-inch thick caskets anyway, for pity's sake). Vaults: that number hasn't gone down much. It's about 1.6 million tons.
