### ANTI-HUMAN TRAFFICKING MINISTRY

### Not Just Talk

IN OCTOBER, we hosted speakers from Sanctuary for Families, Restore, and End Child Prostitution and Trafficking (ECPAT) for a "Not Just Talk: Taking Action on Human Trafficking" event.

The three-hour forum on Oct. 18 featured professionals working to end this problem in New York City who discussed how we can help make a difference. Ending human trafficking is close to our heart at Plymouth, and one of the issues that funding from the Underground Thrift benefits.

"Liberty is the soul's right to breathe," the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher said from our pulpit in 1887.

Beth Fleisher, head of the Anti-Human Trafficking Ministry who planned the



event, recently wrote on her blog:
"There's a phrase that sticks in my head
from a Sunday School song that we sang
when I was a kid: 'Whatsoever you do, to
the least of my brothers, that you do unto
me.' This morning I may search for the
gender-neutral translation of that Bible
passage, but I think you get the idea:
when we work with our hands to reach
out to women and children so badly
treated by our own neighbors, in our own
community we reach out and touch the

### Children are hard at work

Each day when the weather permits, in the Cranberry Street playground, the children are hard at work learning how to play with each other. A typical day will find all corners of the playground in use. It's a true laboratory for growth. Children love to test their growing bodies with new physical challenges, as well as make social connections with new friends.

Children teach us to observe the world around us closely. Rocks, bugs, seeds and leaves provide them with evidence that the world is a magical place. With these needs in mind, the school plans on purchasing a new shed for equipment and some new tables for eating and working outside. A portion of the funds raised from Yankee Fair will be used for this purpose.

Chapel on Friday continues to play a central role in the life of the school. The weekly story, blessing and song provide us with a central theme that encourages compassion for others. A seasonal community project allows the group to come together and help others. Our project this fall supported the work of a medical mission that helps children born with cleft palates. A visit from a member of the team allowed the children to ask questions about how doctors can help children in need.

Beginning in January, Plymouth Church School staff and families will be intimately involved with an exhibit called "The Wonder of Learning," which is coming to Brooklyn from the schools of Reggio Emilia, Italy.



The exhibit will highlight the importance of education and schools as places for discussion and mutual exchange. Educators and parents from around the country will attend conferences and workshops and our teachers to be inspired by best practices in the field.

As you can imagine, computers are in use in our classrooms for documentation and communication. We've found that the children prefer to investigate real materials. We are, however, using technology to our advantage in the school office. Our new online application promises to simplify the transfer of information between home and school and allow us to fully integrate the enrollment process. This will allow us to spend more time working directly with the children. What could be better?

forms and saves lives. However, churches are different in important ways. In the Congregational tradition, we believe strongly in the authority of the local church to chart it's future, while some of our sister churches are more hierarchical. I'm looking forward to learning some of the things that are unique to Plymouth, including its history and vision for the future.

The word interim means, at least in one sense, a time of being in between. Plymouth is, indeed, in between David's and Al's ministries, and that of your next settled minister. Yet, I think it's better thought of as an active time of transition – a time to celebrate the joys of the past, continue the momentum of the present, and begin to plan for a vital future. I look forward to taking part in your transition.

A wise minister once said that a minister is like a river guide for their congregation. He or she helps those journeying down the river to pick the right craft – canoe, kayak or rowboat – for a particular place on the river. But in the end, the river guide and the congregation are making the same journey together. I look forwarding to journeying with you a little down the river in the coming months. I also hope to meet and to get to know each of you in my time at Plymouth Church.

### Gifts for the King



Plymouth's annual "Gifts for the King" will be donated to the Mission School of Hope (MSH) to purchase a truck to transport medical workers, materials and supplies to its mission site in Eastern Cameroon, Africa.

MSH provides medical care, education and support to the Baka people, a nomadic African tribe. The Rev. Charles Sagay discovered these people, who were in great need, about 30 years ago and has dedicated his life to their survival and self-sufficiency. MSH advocates for the education of the Baka children so they can learn to help their people.

Plymouth Church began partnering with MSH about 10 years ago, and our gifts have

enabled the Baka tribe to have clean water, school buildings and a medical clinic. The Rev. Sagay and the tribe refer to our partnership as the "backbone" of the ministry.

One of the biggest challenges facing MSH is the poor condition of the access roads to the mission site. MSH doesn't own a vehicle, making it difficult, time consuming, costly and dangerous to transport what's needed.

The Rev. Sagay says the gift of a truck could transform lives, and sends his love and appreciation to Plymouth. They thank the Lord for this special partnership.
