Dr. George Sakheim

shares his experience as an interpreter and translator for the Nuremberg trial of war criminals in 1945-1946.

He had a front row seat, literally, to a parade of some of Nazi Germany's most notorious war criminals including Hermann Goring.

George Sakheim was born in Hamburg and fled with his mother from Nazi persecution to Palestine in 1933. In 1938 he came to America where he attended Columbia University. During World War II he served in military intelligence, prisoner of war interrogation with the 104th Infantry Division, and from October 1945 to May 1946 he was an interpreter at the main Nuremberg War Crimes Trial.
