THE GREAT AMERICAN TRAILER PARK MUSICAL



The Great American Trailer Park Musical follows three very southern characters residing in Armadillo Acres Trailer Park, the other side of the tracks in Starke, Florida. Meet Norbert, a tollbooth collector, Jeannie, his agoraphobic wife and Pippi, a stripper, all caught in a love triangle narrated by a trashy trio acting as the show's Greek chorus. Belting out catchy tunes, dripping with dysfunction, the girls invite the audience into a world full of Astroturf, road kill, spray cheese and pure, unadulterated fun. The musical serves as an entertaining twist of tasteless humor and sly stereotypes on American culture.

Directed by Dawn Lebrecht Fornara, *The Great American Trailer Park Musical* includes Jenna Canfield as Pippi, Debi Guthery as Betty, Lisa Federico as Lin, Greg Jensen as Duke, Randall Kenneth Jones as Norbert, Alyssa Lee as Pickles, and Laura Needle as Jeannie.

The show will be performed Wednesdays through Saturdays at 8pm and Sundays at 2pm. Tickets are \$40 for adults and \$10 for students 21 and under.



What's With the TBA?

ou may have noticed that when we announced this season there was a conspicuous TBA in the January Blackburn time slot. Now we've heard all the jokes, "Wow, I love TBA (pronounced ti-bah)," "Didn't TBA win the TONY?" But seriously, why are shows some times To Be Announced?

When the Naples Players decide to produce a particular show that is just the beginning of the process. Like any artist, a playwright protects his or her work through copyrighting and therefore we must apply

for the rights to perform a certain show. Now, there are many factors that go into the decision making process of whether we are granted those rights or not. Certain shows may have restricted rights which means a number of things: (1) the play may be running on or Off-Broadway or perhaps enjoying a national tour, (2) a professional theatre in our area has already secured the



rights to perform the same show or (3) the author has put his or her own limitations on which locations can produce the show or the amount of productions that can occur at the same time.

For the most part this is a seamless process. However, there are those times when the rights are denied and we have to either reapply at a specified

time or abandon the show for that particular season. In the hope that we will receive the rights for that season, there are times when we will delay the announcement of a specific show until our application has been accepted. Still, there is no guarantee that we will receive the rights and therefore we may have to choose alternate material.

So with that being said, we are happy to announce that A.R. Gurney's endearing comedy, *Black Tie*, has been chosen for our January Blackburn show. So remember, the next time you see a TBA in our season just know we are anxiously awaiting the rights to an exciting show.

A Tribute to Dorothy Bednar

Dorothy Bednar passed away in July and we would like to remember her many contributions to The Naples Players. Shortly after hurricane Andrew in 1992, Dorothy moved from Miami to Naples. She was a recent widow, a retired realtor and former teacher, when she began to usher at the old Playhouse on Goodlette-Frank Road.

By the mid-90s, Dorothy was an active member of the Theatre Guild, created to support the fundraising efforts of the future Sugden Community Theatre. When the doors opened in 1998, Dorothy, along with Gloria Ingleman and the late Joan LeGrand, organized the usher program as the next Guild project.

She was a Naples Players member for nearly twenty years, logging over 3000 volunteer hours. She was tireless as an usher, Guild member, and Guild President serving on TNP's Board of Directors. In 2008, Dorothy Bednar received The Naples Players' highest recognition, Life Member, an award well deserved.
