

Summer Ethics Fellowships for Seminary and Divinity School Students

The Fellowships at Auschwitz for the Study of Professional Ethics (FASPE) seeks applications for its **2014 fellowships**. FASPE Seminary, a component of a larger program that works with students in various fields, uses the conduct of the clergy in Nazi Germany and the Holocaust as a launching point for an intensive course of study on the ethical challenges of religious leadership. FASPE is predicated upon the power of place, and in particular the first-hand experience of visiting Auschwitz and traveling through Germany and Poland where Fellows study the past and consider how to apply the lessons of history as they confront the ethical challenges of today.

In 2014 FASPE will take 10-15 seminary and divinity school students on an all-expensespaid tip from New York to Berlin, Krakow and Oświęcim (Auschwitz) to examine topics like: "God's shadow" in the wake of the Holocaust; religious faith and the temptations of prejudice; remembrance & forgiveness; and encouraging moral sensitivity.

The 2014 program will run from Sunday, June 15 to Thursday, June 26. Fellowships will cover all program costs, including international and European travel, lodging, and food.

Students of all religious, ethnic, and cultural backgrounds are encouraged to apply. Previous participants have come from schools such as Boston College, Catholic Theological Union, Fuller Theological Seminary, the Hartford Seminary, Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, and Yeshiva University.
