A NOTE FROM YOUR TREASURER

The 40th Annual Celebration of West Ohio Conference United Methodist Women is over, and we have such good memories, which includes Mission Exploration and the 125th Anniversary of the Deaconess Program. When we hear stories of where our Mission Giving goes, it gives the heart a good feeling whether it is on the other side of the globe or in our own back yard. The 40th Annual Celebration Offering was \$2,353.41, the Deaconess Suitcase Offering was \$161.00, the lunch table World Thank Offering was \$266.34 and our special Conference United Methodist Women Team Offering was \$620.00. These Mission Giving dollars help greatly to supplement the remittances of the eight districts, which have been collecting all year.

Other information: The Secretary of Program Resources sold a total of \$1948.43 in literature, so that we may educate ourselves! Then, Assembly 2014! – I registered 85 Officers from throughout West Ohio. As liaison for Assembly, I recently saw there are 4,639 total registrants so far. Keep talking about Assembly 2014. It will be a wonderful United Methodist Women experience!

As I worked throughout the end of the year processing those districts' Mission Giving, I felt the pride and power that makes us dedicated United Methodist Women. - Give praise to the sponsoring or planning group of an activity or meeting.
- Say "thank you" at every opportunity.
- Schedule meetings at times and places so that younger women can participate.

WHAT'S NEW FOR 2014

I'd like to recommend three books, two from the 2014 Reading Program, for your New Year's reading; all three can be used for local organization programs. The three books are the Prayer Calendar 2014, <u>A Faithful Heart</u> by Sally Dyck, and <u>Strong Was Her Faith</u> by J. Ellsworth Kalas.

I hope most, if not all of you, are using the Prayer Calendar during your personal prayer time. But don't forget, so much of this book can be a part of your local organization's programs, especially if you are a very small organization. This year's Calendar shows your mission giving dollars at work both here and abroad by the pictures and individual testimonies for each week. You can find prayers from throughout the world at the beginning of the Calendar, immediately preceding page one. You could do a prayer ministry for birthdays of Mission Interns (MI) and US-2's; these are young adult missionaries who may be away from their home state for the first time and certainly are experiencing life in new and challenging locations. Why not send a birthday card with your organization's personal comments and prayers?

The two books mentioned from the 2014 Reading Program are both from the Spiritual Growth section. You certainly will gain much insight from personal reading, but I'd encourage you to study them during your meetings throughout the year. Bishop Sally Dyck's book, <u>A Faithful Heart</u>, combines scripture, stories, and the faith of the biblical Mary, mother of Jesus, that will help you grow and share your heart. By the way, Bishop Dyck is one of our North Central Jurisdiction bishops. <u>Strong Was Her Faith</u> examines important women of the New Testament, including some who aren't often studied, such as Dorcas, Lydia, and Mary, the mother of John Mark (the Gospel writer). A discussion guide is included with questions and prayer focus for each woman/chapter. Perhaps your pastor would lead a local women's Bible study group for either of these books.

SOCIAL ACTION

I read a very interesting article sent to me by Katey Zeh of Healthy Families Healthy Planet concerning child marriages in developing countries and how early marriages and motherhood affect the women/girls. I think this article epitomizes the goal of Healthy Families Healthy Planet (HFHP) and I encourage you to read it. The site is www.npr.org and the title of the article is "Can Child Marriages Be Stopped?" If you do not have access to internet, I encourage you to ask someone to print it for you. I found it very eye-opening. Did you know that baby deaths in Columbus and Franklin County are higher than the state and national averages (November 18 Columbus Dispatch)? From the litany that was read at Leadership Training in September, while infant mortality in the nation dropped by 11% from 2000 - 2010, Ohio's rate increased by 3%. Ohio ranks 48th in the United States with infant mortality rates, and African American rates is 49%! If this is happening here, you can imagine what it is for developing countries that do not have access to good health care, education, or family planning. HFHP is global so that all women and children, regardless of nationality, are covered by it.

I encourage you to write your representatives/senators to not disproportionately cut funding to education and family planning so that women can plan the timing and spacing of their families. This is so important to many aspects of a country such as economy, education, poverty, etc. Budget discussions will be starting soon since the budget we have now is only temporary, so please write soon.

There are many Ambassadors of Healthy Family Healthy Planet, including me, in our conference. If you would like to have one of us speak to your local unit, please let me know and I can connect you with one in your area.

In November, Alice Graveley and I met with several other women from our conference to discuss Dayton's welcoming immigrants program. Carol Barton, from the national United Methodist Women, was there, and in the course of conversation, we started talking about ways to approach social action.

Some conferences/districts use the same approach as our conference, focusing on several topics. Others focus on one topic, and still others form resource committees which pick topics, and research them in depth, and then disseminate the information. I am interested in how you would like our conference to do social action. If it is different from what we do now, please let me know. However, in your districts/units you can do it in whatever way is best for you.

You are a team. I make the agenda, but we the team do the work. Read your handbook! Then sit with your team and map out the year, month by month. Yes, this team meets often because there are always things to do.

- > Go through the existing file of potential candidates, update it and date materials kept in the file.
- ➤ Look for opportunities to distribute "Recommendation Forms" and/or "Potential Leader Forms."
- Check bylaw requirements related to the positions and to tenure requirements.
- Determine expertise and diversity needed for next year.
- Make specific plans for finding and recruiting possible nominees.
- > Send "Potential Leader Forms" to any prospective nominees who have not completed a form.
- After asking someone to be a nominee, listen to her concerns, answer her questions, and accept any input she may offer. Allow her time to reflect and prayerfully consider your request.

Jane Benner arranged an impromptu gathering at St. Paul UM Church on Tuesday, November 12, 2013. Carol had read an article in the Wall Street Journal which referred to Dayton, Ohio as having an "Immigrant Friendly" policy and she was curious. Before coming to St. Paul, Carol met with a representative of the city's "Welcome Dayton" committee. I shared with the group that while the "Welcome Dayton" policy has many political ramifications, it has improved police relations for many immigrants. People attending this roundtable discussion were Carol Barton, Jane Benner, Connie Pilkington, Beth Vanoli, Joan Johnson, Alice Gravely, Soraya Montano and me.

Our discussion moved to United Methodist Women and how to get the "Immigration" information out to the local organizations. I feel confident that "Immigration" will be one of the United Methodist Women emphases for the next four years. The need for fair and just immigration reform is a pressing issue for our nation. Let's try to stay informed with up-to-date factual information.

Leadership Development Days

Joan Johnson, Tina Basinger, Ann Greiner, Pat Taylor, Paula Nourse, and Janice Deal attended Leadership Development Days (LDD) in November. We each attended workshops pertaining to our leadership positions at the conference and district levels, Bible studies, and worship services. Harriett Jane Olsen, General Secretary, was not able to attend LDD because she was attending the Council of Bishops meeting, but she Skyped with the conference presidents.

United Methodist Women is rooted in controversy because our foremothers were concerned about women having access to health care and girls having access to education. Today, we have similar concerns, and we need to continue their journey of learning, faith, action, and love. Some of that action is accomplished through national mission institutions, and we are so fortunate to have four within West Ohio Conference.

United Methodist Women is launching a new website in January. In the meantime, you can download the complete handbook for free, print a new Thank Offering box, and read the United Methodist Women In Mission Annual Report 2012. Read, study, and use the tools and resources available on the website (www.unitedmethodistwomen.org) for your learning journey.

As United Methodist Women, we face controversy every day. One of the Racial Justice workshops analyzed race and the media. We learned how to "pray the news" as one technique to evaluate the news. In another workshop "Standing in Our Faith" we practiced techniques (such as use of a pause, ask a question, know when to move on, challenge the source of information, and always be truthful) for handling unpopular issues. Our guides should be the Bible, the Book of Discipline, and the Book of Resolution.

The Bible studies were about radical hospitality and used the stories of Mary and Martha and the woman with the alabaster jar anointing Jesus's feet. How do we make guests feel welcome? How do we welcome Jesus into our lives? For our leadership, Jesus is always enough. Sinful women need United Methodist Women because we are all named and unnamed and sinful.

Deaconess Clara Esther was the program speaker Saturday evening. She told her story of growing up in Memphis, being active in the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s, and moving to Mobile, Alabama, to work at the Dumas Wesley Community Center. She asked, "How is God leading you?" Listen, open your eyes, and Just Do It.
