Workshop 1

Christiana Bratiotis

Community Based Promising Practices to Address Hoarding

Christiana Bratiotis, Ph.D., LICSW, Assistant Professor, University of Nebraska Omaha

Hoarding as a public health issue can lead to health and safety risks to the individual, their family and their neighbors. Attendees will learn about international, national and local models of community and agency based interventions for hoarding. Details about practice models focused on community education, individual case intervention and coordinated cross-disciplinary efforts will be shared. In addition, participants will have the opportunity to learn from and talk with leaders of unique Massachusetts-based hoarding intervention programs.

Workshop 2

Hoarding Disorder and Emergent Findings

Jordana Muroff, Ph.D., LICSW, Assistant Professor, Boston University School of Social Work

Sarah Dowal, MPH, MSW, LCSW, Clinical Research Associate, Institute for Aging Research, Hebrew SeniorLife

To address the problem of hoarding, researchers have been studying the disorder and promising mental health practices have emerged. Attendees of this workshop will learn about the latest psychosocial research examining the course of hoarding, its distinction from OCD, and interventions that are promising. Updates to mental health diagnostic criteria will also be noted. Presenters will discuss specific characteristic features of hoarding (e.g., procrastination, perfectionism, decision-making difficulties) and strategies to address them.

Workshop 3

The Role of Families in Help for Hoarding

Michael A. Tompkins, Ph.D., Co-Director, San Francisco Bay Area Center for Cognitive Therapy

Family members are often significantly impacted by hoarding and are sometimes confused about their role and the best way to help. This workshop utilizes the Community Reinforcement and Family Training (CRAFT) therapeutic model to work with people who hoard. Workshop participants will learn to develop a road map to guide family responses to a loved one's hoarding behavior that includes communication and problem-solving strategies. To guide one in the direction of accepting help, simple behavioral principles, such as rewards and consequences, will be discussed.

Workshop 4

Enhancing Motivation & Engagement with People Who Hoard

Working with people who hoard often presents challenges with regard to engaging in effective treatment for their hoarding problems. Workshop participants will learn communication styles and strategies that facilitate the engagement of reluctant clients. Participants will learn to identify ambivalence and use basic motivational interviewing strategies, as well as to help clients identify and understand their personal goals and values. Brief exercises to practice these methods will be included.

Workshop 5

The Power of Peer Response

Peer response is an emerging intervention strategy for hoarding. Session participants will learn about the Buried in Treasures Workshop (BIT), a tested and standardized peer self-help group model currently being used in communities throughout Massachusetts, the US and beyond. The presenters will describe the content and structure of the BIT and review the evidence regarding its effectiveness. Participants will learn how to facilitate the set up and running of a Buried in Treasures Workshop.

Workshop 6

Hoarding in Rental Housing

A resident's hoarding behavior is likely to result in management problems such as health and safety issues and increased operating costs. In this workshop, attendees will learn about how state and federal housing guidelines apply to people who hoard. Participants will have the opportunity to learn effective strategies for the management team to use in supporting residents to obtain and maintain compliance, including the use of reasonable accommodation. Successful intervention options and promising practices will be discussed.
