



Mission Trip Opens Eyes to Poverty

This year's senior high mission trip was certainly different from the ones I have been a part of in the past. It dealt with America's rural poverty. It was nothing like the Peruvian little towns I visited on the 2012 trip, or the homelessness I witnessed in San Francisco in 2013. From the outside, the town did not appear to be all that poor, but once you spent some time there and learned that the main employers were the Human Resource Center and the school, everything came into perspective. While we were there, the group I was in visited a senior center, and worked with children at the kids club.

My favorite part of the trip happened while we were at the senior center. Annie (Catrone) Atherton and I played many innings of bean-bag baseball with the seniors, including a deaf man named Robert (who was an amazing person and had a great sense of humor; read more about him from Annie's perspective on page 10). It was so cool to see the seniors light up and enjoy the game. We even had to be told to quiet down, because our cheering was too loud and hurting people's ears, every time one of us scored a homerun.

At the beginning of the trip I was a little worried that my group would be doing exclusively relational ministry. Personally, I am more comfortable with labor-orientated tasks such as painting, building, etc. However, playing that game with the seniors was one of those moments that eased my mind and made the trip more memorable.

Kids club turned out to be so much fun too. Every one of us gave too many piggy-back rides to count and had to handle little children sitting on our laps and hanging all over us; however, no one complained, even though we were in a large, humid gym without air conditioning (just one large fan in the corner) and we were dying of heat.

It was just so amazing to see the children open up to us. All in all, the mission trip was an eye-opening experience. Booneville is a town that is not what it seems to be at first glance. It is way deeper than just some little town; it is a welcoming community. "— Danielle (Dani) Wiggs

Passion Found

In early June, Jane Ratcliff deployed with an ERT— Emergency Response Team — to Colorado, to help Camp Buckhorn get ready for its camping season. Jane had volunteered at Camp Mingus earlier in the summer, to help them cut down trees. "I had the opportunity to work with a wonderful group of people who are dedicated to helping others in need."

A week later, she was in Colorado. "The camp was badly damaged by a forest fire three years ago," Jane said, "and we were asked to help mitigate some of the damage so the camp could reopen and be safe for the children attending." The five-person crew consisted of Jim Reeves, Roger Harlow, Dave Keeney, Tom Knoll,

and Jane. They arrived on Friday night, and began work on Saturday. "After an overview of the damages, Ryan, the camp manager, was able to prioritize the work and so it began. On day three, Pat Gallagher from Las Vegas arrived to supplement the team with Don Olson from Colorado coming in for a weekend," Jane said.

"While we planned on working for three weeks, we departed the camp after two due to equipment failure and crew exhaustion. We were aware that altitude would be an issue, but we did not fully comprehend the amount of work and the level of difficulty, along with not having fully functioning equipment. In spite of the obstacles, we were able to take down, limb and buck over 500 trees, cut out 50 tree stumps and clean up dangerous piles of trees that had been felled the prior year." The Finance Ministry Team and Church Council, along with a budget task force, have worked hard during the last several months to craft a budget that will glorify God and be fiscally responsible. We have been intentional about what we spend and plan to spend, and ask that you be intentional as well. To be intentional means to develop a plan for giving, then following through with your plan to give. In Corinthians 9:6-7, Paul writes, "The point is this, the one who sows sparingly will reap sparingly and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion."

According to Charles R. Lane, in his book titled *Ask*, *Thank*, *Tell*, intentionality is one of the six characteristics of a biblical giver. If you find yourself looking in your wallet or purse as you get out of the car on Sunday morning to discover what may be available for the morning offering, then you probably have some work to do on being intentional in your giving. Likewise, if your giving depends on how much you have in your checkbook from week to week.

Our current budget cuts total \$209,000. They include a freeze on salaries, a reduction in maintenance costs, and elimination of capital improvements. Even with these cuts, we need an additional \$76,000 by January to avoid further cuts. Michael Colbert Experiences First Mission Trip Ever to Booneville, AR

Christopher Wurpts, PVUMC's youth ministry director, invited several adults to participate in the Senior High Mission trip to Booneville, Arkansas, June 28-July 3. Michael Colbert was one of them who responded to the call. Below is his account of the experience, his first long-term mission trip.

"I have done numerous two- to four-hour day projects at local homeless shelters, Feed My Starving Children, etc., but never an overnight. I looked at this as an opportunity to get away, slow things down and serve others. The trip did indeed fulfill these expectations as I spent the time in Booneville away from cell phones, computer and email. I was assigned to Team "Serve" and we had numerous work/painting projects and relational opportunities every day.

"On the second day, our team spent the morning visiting an assisted living facility. We spread ourselves around playing bingo with the residents, then had some follow-up time to visit. It was especially satisfying to see how well our PVUMC youth did relating to a much older crowd, as I observed lots of engagement. During this time, I also noticed a woman who came in late, and was sitting alone in her wheelchair. I went over to sit with her and started asking about her background and family. She was apologetic for her speech, telling me that since her stroke some seven months ago, people had problems understanding her. She became guite happy and was all smiles when I asked if she got to see family members very often, and she proudly said that she saw her daughter (an employee there) almost every day. She continued on with great pride and finally asked me if I would like to meet her daughter, cautioning me that I would have to push her. We went down several hallways and came to her office and had a very pleasant exchange. We were all happy to have made a new friend. (next page)

"My favorite part of the week was our special time each evening after dinner to get together in small groups and exchange the ups and downs of the day. These exchanges were very honest, direct and insightful. I was proud of many of our youth for doing things out of their normal comfort zones. It was eye opening and impressive to witness the bonding and rapport that other adult leaders had with the youth. Previous mission trips and choir trips gave many a special trust and bond that impressed me.

"Overall, it was a terrific experience to meet and get to know many PVUMC members and youth that I did not know before. My world at the church revolves around Church Council, Finance, Church and Society, Wesley Study Group, Open Table, and the 9:30 a.m. service. There was very little overlap on this trip with people I usually spend time with, and it was rewarding and enriching to get to know everyone. To the parents of our youth, I would say: "Well done." We have an outstanding group of young adults who are growing up to learn that life is about giving of themselves, thinking of others and doing things that will make this world a better lace. They are all one step closer to finding true happiness and contentment. I am proud to call them my friends." — Mike Colbert

"While on my mission trip to Booneville, Arkansas, I had so many new experiences, made new friendships and strengthened bonds with old friends. I also gained a new perspective on life and the world," Annie (Catrone) Atherton said about her second youth mission trip experience. One of the people who helped her gain this new perspective was Robert, a deaf gentleman who she got to know when he opened up to her and told her his story about how he became deaf at age four because of an accident.

The first day I met Robert, we talked about a half hour or so and he just told me all of these fun things about himself: his hobbies, favorite color, and favorite animal. Robert was so gracious to give the team I was working with a sign language class, and everyone learned their names and a few other signs. When I came back the next day, Robert and I talked for about two hours! He asked me what my story was, and I told him about where I came from and how I go to school, do sign language, and am in a show choir at my school. After that, we played Robert's favorite game: Bean Bag Baseball. He and I got into the spirit of the game and even though I was not all that good, Robert would cheer me on and I did the same for him. The amount of joy, happiness and peace you could not only just feel in the room but it was just so rich in Robert himself. When it was time for me to go, we both knew I wouldn't be coming back the next day or in a week. He said something to me I will never forget and it changed me so

much. Robert said, "It was nice to meet a teenager who cares about learning a language that they can use to talk to someone like me or another person in my situation. Keep it up and one day you will realize how nice it is to us to have someone who wants to talk to us and who can." I knew from that moment what a difference I made in his life and how happy he was to talk to a teenager and interact with me just because I could sign.

My favorite part of the trip was evening worship every night. We all came together and talked about our day; we sang, read bible verses, and just had bonding time that wasn't possible during the day. In our small groups, we shared our experiences, and how we felt about them. It was just a whole bunch of bonding time and you could see people in their natural state and who they really were. At home, here in Arizona, we're afraid of showing who we really are and showing that we can be broken. On a mission trip like this, when we're away from our comfort zones, we let those feelings and emotions show. The best part is that no one will judge you; they'll just want to help you and sit with you. They'll make you smile and just help you talk about stuff that's going on in your life.

My biggest struggle of the mission trip was actually having to leave, knowing I wouldn't see my new friends from kids club or Robert, as well as the YouthWorks leaders that I had bonded with. The community there was one I have never experienced; everyone was practically family but weren't related by blood. They were always there for one another no matter what, and welcomed us as though we had been there the whole time. But out of every struggle something good comes out, and I'm hoping to help out with another kids camp or a boys and girls club or a senior citizen center here.

Something that happened that was both eye opening and unexpected was having my first day at kids camp and helping this little girl named Lauren who was crying in a corner. She was shy and scared of new people and new kids. It took her a while to know she had my trust and I had hers. After that, we spent the rest of kids camp together. About halfway through camp she called me her best friend, which made me so happy. I wrote her a letter saying how she was my best friend and how she just needs to keep smiling and soon enough she'll have more friends than she can count. She cried when she read it, ran to me and gave me the world's biggest hug. — *Annie (Catrone) Atherton*

Dear Friends.

We have launched a series of exciting changes in our 11:15 a.m. worship service (including moving back the start time slightly). We are now calling this our "Alternative Service." We used to refer to this as a contemporary service, but the term "contemporary" refers to something very recent and up-to-date, which is a challenge in the church. We have moved the location of this service over to our Chapel. We have a new worship leader, Matt Lombardi, who is leading our band and our singing, offering prayers, and helping with the planning. Matt has led our youth in worship since February 2014, and you can read more about him on page 11.

Our planning team met for several months and identified the purpose of this service to be a worship experience where people can connect with God by entering absolutely accepted and welcomed and leave challenged and moved. We want this worship time to be a distinctive alternative, one that is radically intergenerational, so that our young people will want to attend and find it speaks to them. We want worship to be experiential and participatory so that all who come may be involved and engaged. Our great prayer is for the service to be Spirit-filled and led as God moves among us and meets us in fresh ways of worshipping.

Our praise team has led us ably for many years and we appreciate their commitment and gift of music to PVUMC. As we move forward, they will take on a different but still crucial role. Please pray for this refreshed service to speak to all who come and draw people who are not here yet but long to know God. We pray that our youth and young adults, and those who have been "de-churched" or disaffected from religion will want to come and join us and find their faith growing with us.

We also ask you to pray for our church as we face a difficult financial situation. We have worked hard to align our budget with our anticipated income, and we will be sharing regularly about our giving and expenses. There will be some reduction in our church staffing and ministry as we make adjustments for the months ahead. Yet we know that God is with us. God has given us a great vision for our church that will touch many lives and build our future. We know that we need to make some shifts as a congregation. We want a stewardship that orients our entire lives toward God. We want our giving to reflect a vibrant and living faith inside every one of us. When we know and love God we can respond to life differently. Jesus said: "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Matthew 6: 21). We want our primary treasures to be our faith and our relationship with God. When that comes first, every other dimension of our lives will always work better.
