Considered the greatest mathematical genius of antiquity, Archimedes lived in Syracuse, Sicily, in the third century B.C. In 10th-century Constantinople (present-day Istanbul), a scribe copied Archimedes' treatises onto parchment. But in the 13th century, a monk erased the text and recycled the parchment to create a prayer book. In 1999, the Walters Art Museum in Baltimore began a project to read the erased texts. This exhibition highlights 20 leaves from the manuscript to tell the story of its journey and the discovery of new scientific texts from the ancient world. This exclusive viewing is not to be missed.
